

College to offer more e-learning classes

Colby Community College students will network for rural students. have more choices, including online, hybrid, weekend, evening and traditional daytime class offerings beginning this fall.

Online courses taught by Colby instructors include pharmacology, basics, small photovoltaic systems, organizational leadership, theory of leadership in business, retail management, cybersecurity, theatre appreciation, creative writing, elementary Spanish I, introduction to mass media, German, college French, Latin, independent study foreign language, fundamentals of oral communication, and interpersonal communications.

Development and delivery of these classes was made possible by a \$1.97 million grant from the U.S. Department of Education. The "Title III" grant was intended to increase enrollment by developing a "distance learning"

The e-learning team at the college includes federal grant administrator Chriss Ellison, Title III Activity Director/Online Education Developer Derek Reilley, administrative assistant Julie Weinmann, online student services developer September Williams, and distance education technician Brent Mariman. A faculty/staff development specialist will be hired to complete the team.
