# Moral nature more than cultural norms

In last month's column I suggested that the presence of a moral nature within us is evidence for the existence of the God who placed

But those who do not believe in God have long argued that our moral nature was shaped by our parents and culture. Unfortunately for the skeptic, a growing body of scientific evidence is making this position more and more difficult

According to an article appearing in the London newspaper, *The* Daily Mail, "An astonishing series of experiments is challenging the views ... that our morality is shaped by our parents and experiences." Instead they suggest that the "differences between good and bad may be hardwired into the brain at birth."

One of the leading researchers in this area of study is Dr. Paul Bloom, a professor of psychology at Yale University. According to Dr. Bloom, "You can see glimmers of moral thought, moral judgments and moral feeling even in the first year of life ... some sense of good and evil seems to be bred in the bones."

Dr. Bloom's conclusions pose a serious challenge to the assumption that moral "truth" is a social construct. This is not to say that there is not a great deal of diversity among the various cultures of the world. There is no question that these differences exist. standing of right and wrong, and these similarities are too great to be ignored.

One scholar who has noted these similarities is University of Texas philosopher, J. Budziszewski. In his excellent book, "What We Can't Not Know," Dr. Budziszewski has pointed out that in spite of differences in detail and application; there is a surprising underlying moral consensus among the world's various cultures and religions. He makes and defends another observation that may surprise some; this moral consensus bears a striking resemblance to the Ten Commandments. Like Dr. Bloom, Budziszewski believes that it is hardwired into us.

The evidence, then, would tend to suggest that the apostle Paul was correct; God has written His law on our hearts. But there is something else that seems to be universal; guilt, the inward sense we have failed to live up to this moral code. Who among us has not felt the noisy accusations of conscience? This leads to more questions, before whom are we guilty and what can we do about it? We'll be addressing these ques-


