Living with parents leads to insurance policy problems

TOPEKA - Layoffs and a lack of new job openings have added to a higher rate of unemployment in the United States, leaving an increasing number of new college grads and young adults unable to make ends meet.

Left with limited options, many young people are moving back home – an increasing trend that creates important insurance consequences for these so-called "Boomerangers" and their parents

In this economic environment, many young adults and their parents are finding themselves in a position they never expected. A grown child moving back home can create insurance implications that should be considered carefully and understood well, so everyone stays protected.

A recent Pew Research Center national study found that, in the past year, nearly 13 percent of parents with grown children have had at least one of their adult sons or daughters return home to live because of financial reasons. Saddled with college loans and unexpected job loss, these young adults are forced to live at home until they can find a job and get their finances back on track.

For families who find themselves part of this new phenomenon, I suggest the following

Concerning property insurance, the Boomeranger could keep his or her renter's insurance in force if personal property is to be located at the parents' home.

However, it would probably be a good idea for the young person to see if he or she can be an additional insured under the parents' homeowners policy.

Additionally, young adults might need additional coverage if the move back home forced them to rent a storage locker for their belongings or if they have big-ticket items like electronic equipment that may require coverage beyond what their parents' homeowners

But the good news is parents can keep any member of the family on their auto insurance policy as long as that person lives in the same house. Rates might increase, however, so parents should look for discounts possibilities (multiple vehicles, multiple policies, anti-theft devices and good driving records, to name a few).

With motor vehicle insurance, ers will qualify for an open enrollment period to join their parents' family plan on or after Sept. 23.

If young adults don't qualify for state insurance pools. The Kansas Health Insurance Association insurance pool guarantees coverage to people who have been rejected by private insurers.

In addition, a new federal high risk insurance pool, for persons with health problems who have been uninsured for at least six months, will be offered through the new legislation.
