Ohio van, camper roll east of town

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Two Ohioans ended up in the hospital Tuesday when their van overturned on I-70 southeast of Colby.

William Corsaut of Uniontown, Ohio, was traveling east on I-70 in a 2001 Chevrolet Express van – pulling a camper – at 8:30 p.m. when it went onto the south shoulder, Trooper Minh Huynh of the Kansas Highway Patrol reported. The trooper said Corsaut overcorrected and the vehicle swerved into the south ditch, where it rolled and came to rest facing south. The camper remained attached to the van, ending up also facing south, half on and half off of the pavement.

Menlo offers to help replace old tornado siren

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Menlo city officials want to see a working tornado siren in there the emergency management actown bad enough that they've volunteered to pick up \$1,150 of the cost, Thomas County commissioners learned Monday.

This was good news for the commissioners, since three of the county's sirens need to be replaced at a cost of about \$55,000 total. The Menlo installation is expected to cost about \$16,000.

"It's good they are willing to help," said Commissioner Byron Sowers. "Now we have to wait and see what direction the grant will take, and where the cost share will be taken from."

Emergency Preparedness Director Susan McMahan is applying for a grant from the U.S. Department of Agriculture Rural Development agency that might pay up to 75 percent of the cost of

McMahan said her department that that if it could be brought

County Clerk Shelly Harms reminded the commissioners that count is part of the general fund, and said that the siren purchase would not bust the budget.

"The Rexford siren needs to be solved, but Colby's could wait," she said, "and the cost of the one for Rexford will come to around \$16,400. Rexford doesn't qualify for a grant because their median income is too high'

She said that Dave Cates from Blue Valley Safety, the Missouri company the county buys sirens from, will come next Wednesday to drive the area to see how many units Colby will need. There has been quite a build up of businesses in the south part of town since the last study, she noted.

Sowers suggested the city of Rexford be contacted to see if they wanted to make a contribution to the cost of a new siren, adding

Commissioner Paul Steele said it might be a good idea to ask the banks if they would work out a lease-purchase to take some heat off the budget. But Sowers said he didn't want to tie up a payment five years into the future because of the uncertainty of the economy, adding that he'd rather use the
