The Colby American Legion baseball team snapped a threegame losing streak on Wednesday, splitting a doubleheader with Ellis at the Colby Recreational Fields.

The Eagles won the first game 8-5 and lost the second 10-1. The second game had to be called after four innings due to lightning.

Braden Sager turned in a solid effort from the mound in the first game. He buckled down and threw two scoreless innings in the sixth and seventh to help Colby pick up

Sager looked impressive in the first, getting Ellis out in order. However, the Railroaders were the first to get on the scoreboard: a runner scored from third on a bloop single to right in the top of the second. Later, with runners on first and second and one out, second baseman Todd Kane fielded a grounder, stepped on the bag and fired to first baseman Nathan Quagliano for a double play.

Sager pounded a single between the short and third early the bottom of the second. Catcher Jake Thompson went in to run for Sager.

Later, Thompson scored when the Railroaders' catcher tried to throw him out at third. The throw was too far to the left and it went into the outfield, allowing Thompson to score.

Ellis reclaimed the lead in the top of the third, when a runner short and third.
