"Since we are in an area where the arts and theater are not readily available, we try to bring some of the world to northwest Kansas," said Executive Director Pat Ziegelmeier.



## 2010 census returns down; workers still making rounds

The 2010 census is in its final stage, but information the Census Bureau sent to the Thomas County Economic Development office says returns here are less than adequate. Figures for the five surrounding counties are no better.

Anyone who hasn't participated in the census yet can call (866) 872-6868, and give information over the phone through Friday.

The bureau notes that federal law requires participation in the census. If you don't send back your form, you may receive a visit from a census taker. The employee who collects the information is sworn for life to protect your information under federal

The bureau has a few tips if a census taker visits: • First, ask to see identification. All census workers carry official government badges marked with just their name, but they may also have a "U.S. Census Bureau" bag. A census taker will never ask to enter your home. If you're not certain about their identity, call the Regional Census Center to confirm they are employed by the Census Bureau. Answer the census form questions for your entire household, but note that you must be at least 15 to answer.

• If a Census worker visits when you are not at home, they will leave a contact number, If no census taker has visited your home, or you have a question about your participation, call your census office. The phone number for northwest Kansas is (620) 682-

Through mid-August, the Census Bureau says, workers will call households if they need to clarify any answers about the number of people living there. The calls are simply to clarify answers that have been given and to make sure everyone is counted only once, and in the right location.

The caller will identify themselves as working for the US. Census Bureau and will state the purpose for the call, the bureau says. Caller ID should show "U.S. Census Bureau." If the text is not supported, such as on a cell phone, then the inbound toll-free number should show up.

If you want to confirm you have been contacted by the Census Bureau, call (866) 851-2010 and use the eight-digit case identification number given by the worker to complete the interview. The interview will take about 10 minutes.

Census takers do not ask for your Social Security number, bank account number or credit card number, as scammers might. They never solicit donations and will never make e-mail contact, nor will they ask about citizenship status.

If an interviewer calls and no one answers, he or she will leave a message asking someone to return the call. The caller will leave a case identification number so someone in the household can call back and complete the interview.
