Color coding helps with move

Dear Heloise: My wife and I just completed our 13th move. But MOVING doesn't become any more fun. I thought I'd share with you her system of labeling boxes and furniture. It makes things a lot easier.

- 1. Pack for the house/apartment you're mov-
- 2. Use different colors of duct tape to label boxes and furniture for each room. For example, yellow duct tape was kitchen/dining room; white for basement, etc. For fragile items, we used bright-orange tape and wrote "fragile" on it.
- 3. Use a permanent marker to label the colored

- 5. Draw a diagram on poster board of your new residence. Label each room with colored tape. Place that on the main moving entrance.
- 6. Draw a diagram for each room with the location of furniture. Place this diagram on the door frame of the specific room.

Bidding Quiz

1. Four spades. The value of a hand almost 1 always rises or falls as the bidding progresses. Here, for example, when you open the bidding 1 with one heart, your hand is clearly above a minimum opening bid. True, you have only 14 highcard points, but the 4-6-2-1 distribution increases the value of the hand by another two or three When partner responds two clubs, however, the

hand shrinks somewhat in value. You had hoped that he would respond one spade or raise your hearts, but he did neither. His two-club bid didn't help your hand one whit and, in fact, hurt it a bit. You therefore proceed cautiously at your second turn by rebidding two hearts, since the combined hands might turn out to be a total misfit.

But when partner next bids two spades, the situation changes dramatically. Your original evaluation is not only restored but increased, and you show this by jumping to four spades. In effect, you blow cold when partner bids clubs, but hot when he bids spades.

2. Three hearts. Here you simply stick to your story -- namely, that you opened on minimum values and neither of partner's responses has helped you at all. Partner is thus alerted to go easy the rest of the way, since your bids of one, two and three hearts are clearly intended to put a damper on the proceedings.

3. Three notrump. Your earlier two-heart bid limited you to minimum opening strength, and you should now let partner know that you are on the high side for your previous bids by leaping to three notrump. Two notrump at this point would make it sound as though you were dying on your feet and might result in missing your side's best contract.

4. Three clubs. All you can do under the circumstances is to show partner a preference for his first suit. You started with a weak opening bid and should continue to bid your hand weakly in order to slow partner down. If partner now goes off the deep end, the responsibility is entirely his


