Naomi was born to Jeanne Bertrand Nollette and Frederic Adolph Nollette on August 20, 1915. She was born in a farmhouse near Upland, NE., and at the age of 2, moved into Upland. She attended the Upland schools, graduating from high school in 1934.

Following her graduation, her family moved to Monument, KS. It was at Monument that she met her future husband while attending a dance at the Reed Skating Rink. She and Francis Abram (Frank) Flipse were married October 21, 1934 - a union that lasted 65 years, un-

til Frank's death, April 1, 2000. The first years of their marriage were spent mostly in Manhattan, KS at Kansas State University. Naomi attended some classes while Frank was earning his Dr. of Veterinary Medicine de-

gree, however, she was soon busy raising a family. Valerie Jeanne and Bruce Raymond were both born while Frank was still in school. Upon graduation, they moved to Colby, KS where Frank started his veterinary practice. Donald Lee soon joined the family. In 1967, Donnie became so ill that he needed a kidney transplant. At the time, this was a very cutting edge and experimental operation. Naomi never hesitated - as soon as she discovered that she was a match, she insisted that her son have one of her kidneys. Because of the very brave and selfless act of his mother, Donnie enjoyed another 30 years of life

with his family, until his death in July 1997. Naomi was very talented and artistic. She played the piano and organ beautifully. She had very few lessons, playing almost entirely by ear. For many years, she was in demand to play at dances and wedding receptions. She went through various phases of creativity, including needlework, quilt-making, ceramics, and oil paintings - all of which grace the homes of family members. She loved reading and had an extensive library. She found great joy in animals, always owning a dog. She fed all of the neighborhood cats, plus an occasional skunk or opossum. She enjoyed going to Walmart to have coffee with her friends and attending numerous clubs to which she belonged. Christmas Eve in Naomi's living room was a

long-standing tradition of treasured family gathering time. During her lifetime, Naomi was blessed with her 3 children, Valerie (husband Darrel), Bruce (wife Cleona) and Donnie (wife Rosa) plus 12 grandchildren, 23 great-grandchildren, and 3 great-great grandchildren. She was preceded in death by her parents Jeanne and Adolph Nollette, her sister Celina Graham, brothers Paul, Reginald and Marcel, her husband Frank, and her son Donald. Naomi passed away September 29, 2010 at 95 years of age.

Services were conducted at Harrison Chapel, Colby, Kansas on Friday, October 1 2010, with pastor James Mardock officiating. Jeff Wagoner sang and played "On Eagles Wings" and "How Great Thou Art". Special memories were shared by granddaughter, Kim Klotzbach and grandson, Bradley Flipse.
