

## Two golfers finish in top 10

Colby High junior Kaylee Keck and sophomore Karly Kriss both earned all-league honors by placing in the top 10 at the Great West Activities Conference meet Monday at Sugar Hills Golf Club in Goodland.

Keck finished seventh with a round of 100 and Kriss snagged ninth with a 103.

The Lady Eagles golf team took third in the tourney with 436 strokes, the sum of the four lowest scores on the team. Holcomb came in first with 391. The other schools that participated in the tourney were Goodland, Ulysses and Hugoton.

"It was really windy, and that made a few holes absolutely brutal," coach Rick Williams said. "There were a couple of real monsters out there on the back nine that led to some really big num-

bers." Still, senior Brittany Bange posted a personal best score of 108.

"Brittany played great," Williams said. "She missed out on being all league by just a few strokes."

Senior Bailey Koerperich shot a 125 and senior Abby Miller finished with a score of 129. Senior Kim Gerstner shot 132.

The girls will compete in the Class 4A regionals at 9:30 a.m. Saturday at the Russell Municipal Golf Course.

To get to the course, take Interstate 70 east for 131 miles. Go left at U.S. 281 for about two miles, then turn right on East Wichita Ave. Take a right at North Copeland Street and another right on East Second. The golf course is at 1054 E. Second St.

## Golden Plains team remains undefeated

The Golden Plains Middle School football team extended its undefeated streak to 4-0 on last Thursday with a 46-0 win over the Tribune Panthers in Rexford.

The Bulldogs scored near the end of the first quarter when Colter Miller ran in a touchdown. Braden Korte scored on the two-point conversion to give the Bulldogs an 8-0 lead.

Early in the second quarter, Golden Plains fumbled, but Benny Martinez recovered. Then Korte ran for a touchdown and Joseph Koerperich caught the two-point conversion to extend the Bulldogs' lead to 16-0. The Bulldog defense forced Tribune to punt the ball again. Golden Plains fumbled the ball again on the snap, but Cole Ziegelmeier recovered.

Runs by Korte and Miller gained a first down for the Bulldogs. A pass from Korte to Koerperich went high. The next several plays included a run by Korte, who broke several tackles to get a first down, and a run by Miller that led to first and goal for Golden Plains.

Miller eventually rushed for the Bulldogs' third touchdown. Ko-

rted ran for a successful two-point conversion to make it 24-0 with 2:23 left in the half.

The kickoff was caught by a Tribune player, who returned the ball to the 30 before he was brought down by Koerperich and Korte. Tribune tried to run, but they were pushed out of bounds by Benny Martinez. Then Tribune passed and Cole Ziegelmeier pulled down the receiver. Martinez sacked the quarterback for a three-yard loss on the next play.

The Panthers fumbled on a pitch and Golden Plains recovered. On the next play, Korte ran about 50 yards for a touchdown. Ziegelmeier took the handoff and ran it into the end zone, giving the Bulldogs two more.

With the Bulldogs leading 32-0, the Panthers tried to pass. Korte intercepted it and returned the ball for yet another Golden Plains' touchdown.

With only 20 seconds remaining in the first half, Miller took the handoff and ran it into the end zone and the Bulldogs ended the half with a 40-0 lead. At the beginning of the third quarter, Miller rushed for a touchdown, giving the Bulldogs a 46-0 victory.

## Bulldog finishes second

Brewster High sophomore Michael Schmidt took second place out of 16 runners at a cross country meet at Oakley on Tuesday with a time of 20 minutes and 1 second.

It was the first varsity race for Schmidt this season. He has finished first in all five junior varsity

## Tough Nebraska team spoils coach's birthday

MANHATTAN (AP) — Bill Snyder's had happier birthdays.

By the end of Nebraska's dominating 48-13 victory Thursday night, the Kansas State coach must have been feeling every one of his 71 years.

"Happy birthday," he said grimly as he opened his postgame news conference. "I hope yours was better than mine."

It may have been Snyder's birthday, but the night belonged to the No. 7 Cornhuskers (5-0) and their mercury-cleated redshirt freshman quarterback, Taylor Martinez.

Martinez rushed for 242 yards and four touchdowns and Nebraska ended a 99-year rivalry in the

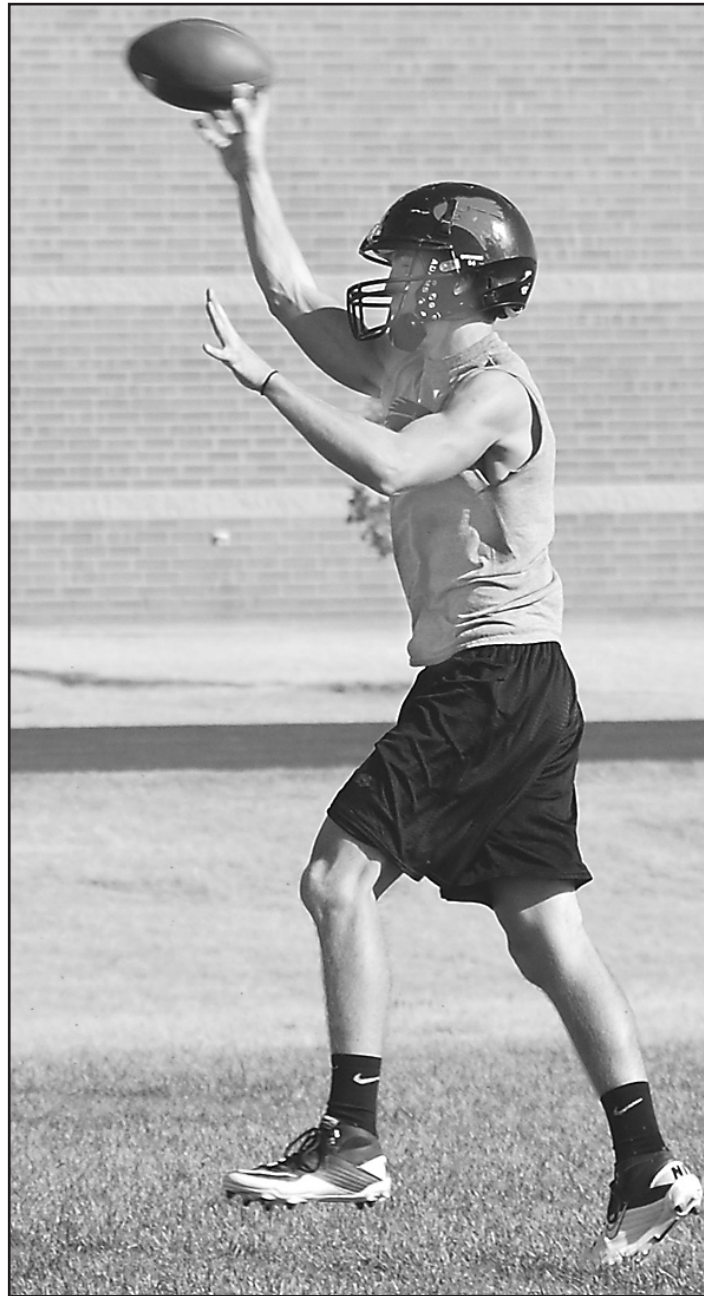
same lopsided fashion it began, thrashing the slower, outmanned Wildcats 48-13.

Martinez pushed his five-game rushing total to 737 yards and also threw a 79-yard scoring pass for the Huskers, who head off for the Big Ten next year. They closed their long rivalry against the Wildcats (4-1) with a 78-15-2 record in the series.

Unbeaten in their first four games a Kansas State fans had hoped to send the Huskers out the Big 12 door with a loss.

But the Wildcats were helpless against Martinez, who broke the team record for rushing yards by a quarterback.

The coach said freshman outside hitter and middle blocker Ashley McMullen has been playing pretty well. She said McMullen is fast, which allows the Lady Trojans to run a faster offense.

The women swept Garden City Community College 25-14, 25-15, 25-16 on Monday.

With the wins, Colby improved to 22-11 and 6-3 in the Kansas Jayhawk Community College Conference.

The Lady Trojans will be col-

The Heartland High School volleyball team beat Healy and Cheylin in a triangular match on Tuesday at the Community Building.

The Lady Crusaders made 82 percent of their passes in the second set, their highest percentage of the season. Alexi Regier made seven of seven serves, including four aces. The girls made 80 percent of their sets.

The Lady Crusaders called the two teams to pray with them before the Healy/Cheylin match. Coach Regier welcomed them and told them Heartland was glad to have them here.

"Brittany Bear prayed for safety, good sportsmanship and that each player would give their best and do it all for the glory of Jesus, our savior," the coach said.

The Lady Crusaders beat Cheylin 25-16, 25-27, 25-12 in their second match.

They made 88 percent of their serves in the final set. Freshman Amy Myers and Ariel Regier made a combined nine out of nine serves in the set. Cruz had four kills in the third.

"Overall, we're learning a lot about volleyball, but mostly about life," the coach said.

The team went 3-1 in a five-team round robin at Flint Hills Christian School in Manhattan on Saturday sponsored by the Kansas Christian Athletic Association.

The Lady Crusaders beat Flint Hills 26-24, 25-20 in their first match.

Regier said her team made

78 percent of their serves in the match. Amy Myers made 17 out of 17 serves and freshman Brittany Bear made six of six serves.

The coach said the girls' passing wasn't quite up to their ability, but good enough to allow the setters to get the ball to sophomore Alexi Regier, who had six kills.

She said Amy Myers had two kills and Cruz had three kills. Myers and Alexi Regier both had three blocks, helping Heartland keep momentum and win the match.

The Lady Crusaders picked up their second win of the day against Arkansas City Christian Academy 25-15, 25-13.

Ariel Regier, Alexi's sister, made eight of eight serves, including four aces. Cruz made eight of 10 serves and four aces. Amy Myers and Alexi Regier both had three kills and Bandy and Cruz had two kills each.

The girls' third win came against the Derby Invasion. They swept repelled them 25-17, 25-20. Ariel Regier made 17 of 17 serves, including six aces. Amy Myers and Alexi Regier combined for four kills.

The Lady Crusaders sole loss of the day came against the Manhattan Chief, a home-school group.

Bandy made nine of nine serves and one ace. Cruz made 11 of 12 serves and Amy Myers made nine of 10 serves, including two aces.

Ariel Regier made 13 of 18 sets and Bandy made 21 of 26. Alexi Regier had two kills and three blocks and Cruz had four kills and a block.

"We would have rather come out on top, but we learned that just one more serve really does matter and one more pass can make a difference," coach Regier said. "Just a little more effort, a little more accuracy can make the difference between a win and a loss."

"Sometimes in life we focus only on the big decisions when it's really all the little ones that can make the biggest difference."

The Lady Crusaders will have another triangular at 4:30 p.m. Tuesday at the Community Building.
