

Lady Trojans' win final road match

Costly turnovers clip Eagles' wings

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The Colby High football team's 48-25 loss to Concordia on Friday can be summed up in three words: turnovers, turnovers, turnovers.

You take away the turnovers, and we win that game," said senior running back Andrew Flanagin.

The Eagles turned the ball over seven times, six fumbles and one interception. Freshman Beau Brown fumbled three times, Flanagin twice and senior fullback Ryan Parker once, and senior quarterback Kale Arnberger threw the interception.

Eagles had no trouble moving the ball, gaining over 300 yards.

The vast majority of Colby's offense came on the ground. The boys rushed for 262 yards; over half by Arnberger, who finished with 137, but much of Eagle's offensive output was wasted by the fumbles.

Concordia made Colby pay anytime the team had a defensive breakdown. Coach Chris Gardner said he thought his defense did well at sticking to their assignments, but he added that a wellcoached team like Concordia will hurt you any time you miss one.

Two of these slip-ups led to Panther touchdowns. The first was a 70-yard run by Blaine Newton and the second on a 64-yard run by Drake Champlin. Newton finished with 144 rushing yards and the Panthers finished with 411 total.

The Panthers' two long touchdown runs came at inopportune times. Colby was only trailing Concordia 22-13 when the first occurred and the second run took place not long after Arnberger hooked up with senior wide receiver Corbin Stephens for a 36yard touchdown pass.

The Eagles were the first to get on the scoreboard. Newton recovered a fumble by Parker at the Eagles' 38-yard line on the boys' first possession. Concordia went on a drive on its next possession. The Panthers' Blake Woelhoff faked a handoff, drawing Colby's defense, and Woelhoff ran around the left end for a three-vard touchdown. Newton ran in the two-point conversion, giving Concordia a 8-7 lead.

The Panthers only had one more drive in the game. The rest of their touchdowns stemmed from good field position from turnovers or long runs.

Concordia extended its lead after a Brown fumble was recovered by Panthers' on the Eagles' 10. That led to a six-yard touchdown run by Newton.

Newton picked off Arnberger and returned to the Panthers' own 18, but Stephens recovered a Concordia fumble on the Eagles' 32 a few plays later. Brown ran around the left end and took the ball to the Panthers' 1. Then the boys were whistled for a penalty for trying to push the Eagles' back into the end zone on a run. Moments later, a mishandled handoff by Flanagin was recovered by Zach Beims of Concordia at the 5.

Later in the half, Flanagin took the handoff and ran around the left end for a six-yard touchdown, narrowing the gap to 14-13. The Eagles extra point try failed. Newton caught a touchdown pass and the Panthers converted on their twopoint conversion before the half came to an end.

Woelhoff faked a handoff to one back and instead handed the ball to Newton, who ran through a hole in the line and kept going for a 70-yard touchdown on the Panthers' first possession of the third. Concordia's two-point conversion again was good, extending the Panthers' lead to 30-13. The Eagles were never able to mount a serious comeback after that, but they did score two more touchdowns.

Arnberger's 36-yard pass to Stephen and his 62-yard touchdown run both came in the third. Concordia ended up winning 48-25.
