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# All Colby schools get passing marks

Colby schools got passing grades on their state report cards with the release of the latest Adequate Yearly Progress results, district leaders says, but test scores are down from last year.

Schools and districts have to show progress each year – required by the federal No Child Left Behind Act – based on state-written standardized tests, test participation, attendance and graduation rates, said Curriculum Director Diana Wieland. The test scores are from the 2009-2010 school year.

### County to hold tax sale

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The big news at the Thomas County commissioners' meeting on Monday was that the delinquent tax sale, which has been on the agenda for nearly a year, is finally going to happen.

Chairman Ken Christiansen reported County Attorney Bruce Flipse told him two weeks ago that he would have the information for the tax sale ready to go for publication this month, and the sale would be set for November.

Records show it has been 10 years since the last delinquent tax sale. The commissioners said earlier in the year they wanted to have one before the year is over to "keep the county up to speed." After this, they hope to hold a smaller sale every year if needed.

The county signed an agreement with the Southwest Kansas Juvenile Detention group in Garden City to take juvenile offenders when they must be See "SALE," Page 3

locked up. A privately run juvenile facility in Wa-Keeney that had planned to reopen in late summer didn't receive enough interest from the northwest counties to support it, commissioners said.

Undersheriff Mark Finley said the numbers of juveniles taken to the lockup varies. The commissioners said the \$145-per-day charge at Garden City is

not bad because the county uses the service so little. In a written report, regional recycling director Lynette Koon said the e-waste pilot program ended Oct. 1 with a total collection of 215 tons of old computers, televisions and the like. She said that had the state given them money for another two years of free collection, that figure could have been greatly increased.

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
If you like coffee and donuts, ham and beans, new cars and trucks, then Tubbs and Son's Ford Sales in Colby is where you'll want to be on Friday.


