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Love's cashier killed in crash near Oberlin

died Wednesday morning when and worked at Love's in Colby. his Jeep struck a semi-trailer just south of Oberlin.

Michael Leroy Quakenbush, 26, of Oberlin, was driving home from Colby on U.S. 83 at 8:30 a.m. when his 1989 Jeep crossed the center line and hit the truck's trailer. Much of the Jeep's front end was crushed and it came to rest on its top. Quakenbush was pronounced dead at the scene by a Decatur County Sheriff's deputy. He had not been wearing a seat-

The driver of the truck, Kenneth Jones, 64, of Altus, Okla., was not injured. The trailer suffered only minor damage to its back wheels.

Four troopers from the Kansas Highway Patrol responded to the scene as well as three sheriff's lice and the city fire department.

The Community Garden was a learning experience, said volunteer Orvella Romine of the Thomas County Coalition. It was fun, rewarding, hard work and it taught patience, work ethics and how to work with other people.

The plans now are to do it again, Romine said, only this time it will bigger and better. The garden plot, on the Kansas State University Experiment Farm, will be doubled in size for next summer.

Romine was one of 32 volunteers, including nine youth, who helped make the garden a success. Members worked a total of 215.5 hours through the

This was the first year for the community garden. The gardeners took on a plot 20 feet wide by 120 feet long. Romine said they didn't know in the beginning if anyone would participate, but word soon got around for families and individuals about the opportunity to learn gardening skills, teamwork and develop healthy eating habits.

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Saturday marks beginning of pheasant, quail seasons

The day many hunters have been waiting for is al- coordinator, said the relatively mild winter helped most here, the start of pheasant season.

The pheasant and quail seasons begin Saturday and continues until Jan. 31. The daily bag limit for pheasants is four cocks. The birds must have a foot, plumage or other part to determine sex still attached. The daily limit for quail is eight.

Although there are some quail in northwest Kansas, pheasants are far more common. The Department of Wildlife and Parks does a six-week survey of pheasant and quail populations. This year they observed about 14 pheasants per day in northwest Kansas, compared to only one quail. The region also holds the most pheasants of any in Kansas.

The northwest region includes everything from Cheyenne to Ellis Counties.

In an October interview, Jim Pitman, small game

pheasant populations flourish. The pheasant population has been steadily increasing over the past decade. In 2002, department observers found only two pheasants per day.

Pheasant season is always a big draw for Thomas County. Most of the hotel rooms are already booked and some restaurants are offering hunter specials.

Despite a drizzly Thursday and damp Friday, hunters can expect clear weather this weekend. The National Weather Service in Goodland is predicting partly-sunny skies Saturday with a high near 49 and 10 to 15 mph winds from the northwest. Temperatures will get down to about 22 degrees at night. Sunday will be also be partly cloudy with a high near 49. The service is not predicting any moisture.
