The Psalmist wrote, "It is good to give thanks unto the Lord." And onomy 8:11-14)



Thanksgiving carries value for all

it is. This is especially so for those of us fortunate enough to live in the U.S., a country blessed as no other nation in the history of the world.

But we cannot help but notice that the more prosperous we have become, each generation seems less thankful. In this, we resemble the ancient Israelites. Before they entered the Promised Land, Moses gave them this solemn warning:

"Beware that you do not forget the LORD your God.... Otherwise, when you have eaten and are satisfied, and have built good houses and lived in them, and when your herds and your flocks multiply, and your silver and gold multiply, and all that you have multiplies, then your heart will become proud and you will forget the LORD your God " (Deuter-

that if they did forget the Lord, their prosperity would be short lived. You see, prosperity is a blessing, not a birthright, and what is enjoyed and taken for granted today may be taken from us tomor-

In 1863, our nation was in the midst of a terrible civil war. Things were going poorly for the North. The blessing of peace had been removed and the future of the union was in doubt. In the White House, our president, who was making a personal spiritual journey from skepticism to faith, reflected on these things.

Abraham Lincoln had gradually come to believe that the Civil War was a divine judgment that had come upon the nation because America, like ancient Israel, had forgotten God. And so he wrote:

We have forgotten God. We have forgotten the gracious hand which preserved us in peace and multiplied and enriched and vainly imagined, in the deceitfulness of our hearts, that all these


He also warned them blessings were produced by some superior wisdom or virtue of our own. Intoxicated by unbroken success, we have become too selfsufficient to feel the necessity of redeeming and preserving grace, too proud to pray to the God who made us.'

And so he called the nation to a day to "set apart and observe the last Thursday of November as a day of Thanksgiving and praise to our beneficent Father who dwelleth in the heavens." And so he called the nation to prayer.

It would be politically incorrect for any of our leaders to repeat these words today. In fact, even to suggest such thoughts might signal the end of a promising political career.






