Famous Hand

This deal from the 1987 world women's team championship dramatically demonstrates how important the opening lead can be in determining the outcome of a hand. The deal occurred in 1 the semifinal match between two teams from the United States.

The bidding was exactly the same at both ta- 2 bles, but that is where the similarity ended. At the first table, West elected to lead a diamond since

North-South seemed unconcerned about spades. East won the first trick with the king and returned the ten, after which there was no way to defeat the contract. West could duck South's queen or win the trick with the ace and return a diamond or a spade. Regardless of West's choice, however, declarer now had the timing to score nine tricks, thanks in large part to the fall of the 2 nine of diamonds on the third round. After this start, the only tricks the defenders could muster were two diamonds, a spade and perhaps a heart.

At the second table, West decided to lead a low spade, reasoning that if her partner had any spade honor, there would be a good chance to defeat the contract. Declarer won East's queen with the king (holding up would not have helped) and immediately led the queen of clubs, covered by the king and ace. But when she next cashed the A-K-Q of hearts and the suit failed to divide 3-3, the hand fell apart.

South tried leading a diamond to the queen, but West took the ace and returned a diamond to East's king. East cashed the ten of hearts and returned a spade through declarer's J-6, allowing West to collect four spade tricks. When the dust settled, the defenders had scored seven tricks, and the contract was down three. This gave their team a combined total of 900 points and a pickup of 14 IMPs on the deal.
