

Golden Plains scholars finish sixth in Goodland

The Golden Plains High School varsity Scholars Bowl team finished sixth in a meet at Goodland on Nov. 15 and took second out of five teams in Grainfield on Nov. 22.

The Bulldogs beat Tribune and Quinter at Goodand but lost to Hoxie, Rawlins County and Colby. The team's strengths at the meet were in math, social studies and science. Lucas Phillips led the scoring with 110 points, David Hunt added 60 and Avery Spresser chipped in 20.

The varsity and junior varsity teams both competed at Grainfield. The varsity won one close match over Wallace County, but lost to Weskan, Tribune and Quinter. All the matches were close – within one or two questions.

The team's strengths were in math, social studies and fine arts. Hunt led the scoring with 35, Phillips added 30, Spresser scored 20, and Randi Cressler 10. Devinn Ritter also competed.

Hoxie piano player releases newest album

Twila Bainter of Hoxie says she knew from a young age she had a gift of music, especially playing the piano by ear. But it wasn't until her mid 20s, after accepting the Lord in her life, that she decided to begin playing, not for herself, but for Jesus.

Now, nearly 40 years later, she is putting the music she composed and played into compact discs in hopes it will bring others to know the Lord more fully.

Newly released is a two-CD set entitled "Twila's Favorites" with 36 piano pieces, most written by Bainter. Also included are traditional favorites such as "Amazing Grace" and "How Great Thou Art."

"I just enjoy creating an atmosphere of praise and worship," Bainter said. "I believe this music is anointed by the Lord and should be used to honor him."

Bainter said the Lord has especially blessed her because she is able to play after an accident

The accident occurred at sunset 18 years ago, as Bainter's husband, Jim, just returned from flying his friend's plane. The friend wanted Jim to park the plane in a different hanger, and Twila was rushing up to the plane to tell her Hoxie planist Twila Bainter practices at her plano. Bainter rehusband this when she ran right into the propeller, not knowing it was still turning.

Doctors did not think they were going to be able to save two of her fingers, but after a sixhour surgery and eight weeks of therapy, Bainter sat back down at the piano and the notes followed.
