Find time to nourish body and mind

It's hard to live a joyful life when your cup is almost empty. Take responsibility for filling up that cup and demand less of others to fill it

When you don't take care of yourself, you can become irritable, overwhelmed, depressed or physically sick. As unpleasant as that can be, the situation becomes even worse when how you feel begins to affect how you deal with family and friends. You can have so little energy that you resent responding to your family's needs, or can't meet them at all.

Avoid this kind of burnout by taking care of yourself. Experts recommend at least 30 minutes of self-nurturing time each day. It will take commitment, determination, and creativity – but it is well worth it!

First you need to "find" this 30 minutes a day. Some possible ideas: Get up 30 minutes earlier or go to bed 30 minutes later, squeeze 30 minutes out of your lunch hour. If you have children, alternate time off with your partner, swap babysitting with a relative or friend or hire a sitter. Get creative and find the time.

Once you find time for yourself, use it wisely. Catching up on bill paying or returning business calls is not restorative! Use your time to take a bubble bath or a relaxing hot shower, play a musical instrument, draw, paint, read, walk, meditate, think or dream.

This past week I attended "Seven Habits of Highly Effective People" training. One of the habits echo's this topic – taking time for you. Stephen Covey, the author of the training (and book) states: "To maintain and increase effectiveness, we must renew ourselves in body, neart, mind, and soul."

Body - the physical dimension. This in-

volves caring for our physical body - eating the right foods, getting enough rest and relax-

"Assume you've had a heart attack in the last month," Covey says. "How would you approach exercise and nutrition?"

Would that prompt some changes in your exercise and diet habits? The time is now, not after you have pushed it too far and have a major health problem.

Heart – the social/emotional dimension.

"Assume that everything you say about people will be heard by them," Covey says.

Hmmm, might this change some of our conversations? This dimension also includes relationships with others. Work on building existing relationships and developing new ones to widen your circle of friends. Think about what relationships could use some extra devotion. Now schedule those visits.

Mind – the mental dimension. Most of our mental development happens in class, but as soon as we leave the discipline of school, many of us let our minds go soft. We don't do any serious reading or explore new subjects unless they're related to our occupation. We don't think analytically or test our abilities.

I challenge you to keep a journal, develop a new hobby, explore a new subject, read, read

and read. Covey says, "There's no better way to inform and expand your mind on a regular basis than to get into the habit of reading good

Soul - the spiritual dimension. This is your core, your center, your commitment to your value system. It is a private and important part

People commit time to this dimension in very different ways - attend and be involved in the church of your choice, give of your time, money and self, watch, listen and enjoy the world of nature; read inspirational biographies, create a personal mission statement. The question for this dimension is "Assume you have a year to live. What legacy would you want to leave?"

Now that you have found things in each dimension to work on - schedule them. Do it now! These actions that will "fill your cup" are like anything else – they won't happen unless you schedule time for them.

Covey recommends that at the beginning of each week, you schedule your events for the week and to include your "cup filling" chores: Tuesday at noon – lunch with the girls, Wednesday 7 to 9 p.m., read, daily at 6:30 a.m., 15 minutes of prayer and meditation, Monday, Wednesday, Friday and Saturday walk on the treadmill from 7 to 7:30 p.m.

Think about these dimensions and start filling your cup. I suggest starting now, but these lifestyle changes would also make great New Year resolutions. You only get one life. Live it to the best and enjoy the ride!


