Council says no junk cars in some areas

In a divided vote, the Colby City Council decided Tuesday to prohibit junkyards in some industrial zones around the city.

The council changed a zoning ordinance to prohibit vehicle nuisances, weed nuisances, "automobile graveyards" and junkyards from Industrial-1 – or light industrial – zones.

Light industrial districts include manufacturing and assembly plants, some of which use outdoor storage for vehicles or equipment. City Building Official Rick Dickman said the light industrial zone is typically the least restrictive.

"I kind of call it the 'catch-all' zone," Dickman said.

ing on the ordinance changes since July.

The commission had recommended two other changes, which the council did not approve: requiring outdoor storage areas to be enclosed by a city-approved security fence and requiring a hard, all-weather surface for any such area.

Councilman Mark Beringer said he was concerned by that change, saying companies like Murfin Drilling might choose not to expand into adjacent lots if they had to fulfill these requirements.

Some of the council members argued that the ordinance already regulated junkyards "I think we already have these

in place," said Councilman Fred Taylor.

Mayor Ken Bieber disagreed,





Judge strikes down purchase provision of health care reform

RICHMOND, Va. (AP) – A federal judge declared the foundation of President Barack Obama's Monday, ruling that the government cannot require Americans to buy insurance.

The case is expected to end up at the Supreme Court.

In his order, U.S. District Judge Henry E. Hudson said he will allow the law to remain in effect while appeals are heard, meaning there is unlikely to be any immediate impact on other provisions that have already gone into effect. The coverage requirement is not scheduled to begin until 2014.

Even so, Republicans in Congress celebrated the ruling as validation of the arguments they had health care law unconstitutional made for months. Rep. Eric Cantor, R-Va., issued a statement urging the White House to agree to expedite a final ruling by appealing directly to the Supreme Court without first going to a federal appeals court.

> Hudson is the first federal judge to strike down a key part of the law, which had been upheld by other federal judges in Virginia and Michigan. Several other lawsuits have been dismissed and still
