Eagles win four, lose three

The Colby High wrestling team took sixth place out of 18 teams at the Eagle Invitational this week-

Colby went 4-3 in the dual tournament, where teams wrestle seven full dual matches in two days, including a big win over Class 5A Valley Center and a close loss to Hutchinson, a larger Class 5A school.

Pine Creek from Colorado Springs finished first and Garden City took second. Hutchinson and Concordia came in fourth and

The tournament was divided into three pools made up of six teams. Teams faced everyone in their pool once. The squads with the top two records in each pool wrestled in placing round duals Saturday at the Community Building for first through sixth

The three pools wrestled in three places: the Community Building, the high school gymnasium and the grade school gym. Colby's pool duals all took place at the high school.

The boys went 3-1 in pool play Friday.

They pounded Wray from Colorado 54-13 in their first dual. Senior Andrew Flanagin and juniors Brandon Leth and Konnor Kriss, sophomore Dustin Reed and freshman Andrew Taylor all



The Hornets tried to turn the tide by winning the next three matches. Leth stymied Valley Center's momentum by pinning the Hornets' John McCune at 145. The Hornets won the next two matches, one by a pin. The two wins gave Valley Center a 21-20 lead. Flanagin regained the lead for the Eagles by pinning Valley Center's Luke Weldon at 1/1. a 26-21 lead.

junior Clayton Appelhans 5-2 at 189, cutting the Eagles' lead to 26-24. Appelhans was slammed down hard on his shoulder, and the match had to be stopped for a couple of minutes to make sure he was OK. Appelhans gamely decided to finish the match after the brief break.

Smollock got a takedown late in the third period and won the match 6-3. The win gave Colby a 29-24 lead going into the final match.
