State takes Decatur dogs

the weekly Decatur County commissioners meeting, the county received a form and a letter from the state Department of Health and Environment asking for a zoning approval for a site to dispose of dog carcasses. After discussion at the courthouse, the form was signed by Commissioner Ralph Unger with a statement that no county approval was needed.

"No zoning exists for sites outside the City of Oberlin, so no local approval needed," was typed on the form and it was signed and sent back. The form asked for approval to dispose of waste "without a permit."

The state Health Department, among other things, regulates landfills and other in-ground disposal of waste. In a letter dated last Wednesday, it discussed giving Mr. Fortin permission from the Bureau of Waste Management to dispose of the waste, dogs, without a permit. It said that the disposal or burying had to be done

Guidelines spelled out in the letter stated that the animals had to be buried within 48 hours, quick or slaked lime, if needed, had to be added to control odors, the dead animals had to be covered with a minimum of four feet of soil and the site was to be used only as open space.

Stacey Baalman, with the solid waste landfills unit under the Department of Health and Environment, signed the letter. She said the agency was directing all calls on the matter through the public information officer Katie Ingells.

Ms. Ingells was called Wednesday morning but said she didn't have any information compiled yet. Ms. Baalman said that there is a process for this kind of disposal and several people have to sign off on it.

The disposal issue first became public when the manager of the Barton County Landfill re-

ceived a request to dispose of the carcasses. The facility is licensed as a regional landfill, authorized to take waste from outside the

Mark Witt, solid waste manager, said he's managed the facility for 10 years. It's a regional facility, he said, and has the needed permits to take different kinds of waste, including animal carcasses, plus household and commercial

The landfill, said Mr. Witt, was contacted about an option to dispose of euthanized canine carcasses from a project the Kansas Department of Animal Health was working on in Decatur County.

It's not uncommon, he said, for the Barton County landfill to be asked to take different kinds of waste, including animals.

Mr. Witt said they take in between 100 to 200 euthanized dogs through the Humane Societies in the area each week.

Although Mr. Witt can make the decision on what is taken, he said he let the county administrator know about the request.

Eventually, however, it was decided not to take the canines to Barton County.

Onsite disposal can be done only with state permission, he said, but sometimes it is a better option when looking at transportation costs. The landfill, said Mr. Witt, was a secondary

While the estimate may be high, he said, the dogs were estimated at 33 tons. Mr. Witt said he wouldn't have known until the carcasses got to the landfill.

The dumping fee is \$34 a ton, he said, so given the estimate, it would have cost \$1,122 plus a \$25 administrative fee to place them there. The landfill charges the fee on animal carcasses, said Mr. Witt, because they have to keep of records on that type of waste.

many state appointments, and no role for legislators in the selection process. Kansas is one of 11 states with such a system. Arizona and Tennessee have a similar process but, unlike Kansas, they have legislators select some nominating commission members.

But Kansas is the only state in which lawyers chosen only by other lawyers make up a majority of the commission screening applications for the appellate courts. That's led some critics to describe Kansas' system as the least accessible to the public in the nation.
