



Hints help bake great bread

Dear Readers: Do you love to MAKE YOUR OWN BREAD? Here are a couple of hints to help your baking come out of the oven the best it can

- Always use fresh yeast. If it isn't fresh, the bread probably won't rise.

EXOTIC DESSERT





dummy's queen with the king and returned a club through South's ten. Sylvia took the ten with the ace, cashed the nine and, not realizing there were no more clubs left, returned the four. Dummy discarded a diamond, and East of

course trumped with the jack. Declarer overruffed with the queen, but later had to lose a trump trick to Sylvia and so went down one!
