Ryan Diener of Columbia, Mo., has moved to Oberlin as the new "Farm Bill" biologist for as well as assisting farmers and landowners. Pheasants Forever and Quail Forever serving northwest Kansas.

Diener is living in a city-owned house at the former youth ranch at Sappa Park, east of Oberlin. He is a native of Marthasville, Mo., and a graduate of the Washington, Mo., High School.

"My job will be to help anyone in Cheyenne, Decatur, Rawlins, Thomas, Sheridan, Norton and Graham counties who is interested in any wildlife habitats," he said, adding that he will also consult with

area landowners on conservation and land use. Rick Pauls, with the Sunflower Chapter of Pheasants Forever, who helped get a biologist in Oberlin, said he hopes that having him will not only help improve wildlife habitat in the area, but also help landowners willing to get that job done get some money to pay for it.

He added that he hopes that the program will also produce an increase in walk-in hunting leas-

The biologist position was created using money from the Grassroots Conservation Campaign, a ioint effort of Pheasants Forever and Ouail Forever in Kansas. The campaign is a partnership among the U.S. Natural Resources Conservation Service, the Kansas Department of Wildlife and Parks, 40 Kansas Pheasants Forever chapters, 11 Kansas Quail Forever chapters and sponsoring corporations, foundations and individuals to improve a million acres of Kansas habitat for pheas-

ants, quail and other wildlife.

The program is designed to provide technical assistance to farmers and ranchers, through oneon-one consulting, about the benefits of conservation programs, such as the Conservation Reserve,

Pheasants Forever began employing Farm Bill biologists in 2003, the organization says, and now has more than 60 working in 12 states: Colorado, Illinois, Iowa, Idaho, Kansas, Minnesota, Nebraska, North Dakota, Ohio, Pennsylvania, South Dakota and Wisconsin. The biologists have contacted and consulted with more than 35,000 landowners, resulting in the improvement of more than 1.34 million acres of land for wildlife.

Diener is Kansas' fourth Farm Bill Wildlife biologist

"It's great to finally have this position in place for the folks in northwest Kansas," said Steve Riley, Pheasants Forever Farm Bill biologist manager. "We have been looking for just the right person for this position for some time now, and are

pleased that Ryan has joined our team.' Diener said he earned a Bachelor of Science degree in fisheries and wildlife from the University of Missouri in May. Before joining Pheasants Forever, he worked in several wildlife jobs in Missouri and North Dakota.


