The Korengal Valley is often considered the worst of the worst in Afghanistan. This tribal area is so remote and poor, with tribal autonomy, that no one has succeeded in conquering the people of the area.

Junger has written this book to explain how men of war bond and respond in war. He wants the reader to understand that these fighting men live with such intensity that every decision and action is scrutinized. Even putting on one's boots and tying ones shoelaces can have consequences.

He hopes to portray the deep relationships that are forged during this time of service. Junger believes that re-entry into normal, everyday life is most difficult for soldiers. Having lived with such pressure and intensity can make life seem less fulfilling. There are three main divisions in this book: Book One: Fear; Book Two: Killing; Book Three: Love. Twelve pages of footnotes disclose sources and references. I recommend this book highly.

On a less serious note: We also have added the book "All by My Selves: Walter, Peanut, Achmed, and Me," by comedian and ventriloquist Jeff Dunham. Dunham age 8, and became "a ventriloquist junky." Reading this book allowed me to learn that there is a world of ventriloquists out there that you may not know existed. They have yearly conventions and their history is well documented.

Dunham's book discusses his growth as a child, his parents and their relationship with his gift, and the way he becomes more recog-

nized over time. His dummies tell more about Dunham in the book than the author does. The Dummies take on a life in print and not just on the

I guess when such personalities are part of your life and career, and a person is use to using them as foils and another voice for brilliance, then they must be included in a book too. Enjoy the journey he tells.

We have many other items coming on the shelf that I have not had time to tell you about. For the youths, we just received all eight books of the series "Dear Dumb Diary" by Jim Benton. More new video disks will be added this week as well.
