# Filing open for school elections

April elections will determine who sits on six area school boards, the Colby college board and city councils, but the time to file for office is now, with the deadline in less than two weeks, Tuesday, Jan. 25.

A general election for school board members, as well as several Colby Community College trustees and city council members, will be Tuesday, April 5. Primaries, if needed, would be held Tuesday, March 1.

Four positions each are up for election on boards in Colby, Oakley, Grinnell, Brewster and Golden Plains and three seats in the Triplains district around Winona. All six districts cover parts of Thomas County.

Filing is open until noon on Jan. 25. Anyone who wants to run must file with the county clerk. There is a filing fee of \$5, or a candidate may present a petition signed by 50 registered voters from the dis-

The four seats on the Colby board are "at-large," meaning they are voted on by all registered being divided up by districts. The four candidates with the highest vote totals will win. Terms are four years.

The four seat are currently held by Kevan Taylor, Ed Geihsler, Omar Weber and Stan Molstad.

• Taylor, who has been on the board for eight years, said he is not running for re-election. Taylor said he has enjoyed his time on the board, but said it was time to step down.

"I'm still interested in what goes on in USD 315," he said, "but being that my kids are out of school now and I've been on for eight years, it's time to let someone else try."

• Geihsler has already filed for re-election. He was appointed by the board to fill Joel Powell's seat when he resigned in June. Geihsler said his time on the board has been challenging because of the state budget crisis.

"It would be nice to come to a board meeting and hear 'we're rich," he said, "but the future is pretty grim."

Geihsler said despite the budget crunch, the district has pulled together to get things done. He said his top priorities are communication, supporting the staff and putting kids first.

Geihsler is a foreman at Ken Frahm Farms.

• Weber said he will be running voters in the district, rather than for re-election. He was first elected in 2007, and said he's pleased and proud to be a part of the board
