I ran across an article last week in which a man was talking about the problem he has had in his life with the "just this once" moments.

You know those moments, don't you? I am pretty sure we're all familiar with them. They are those moments when we run up against a situation that goes against the grain, but after we think about it, we say, "Well, what could it hurt? It's just this once."

The statement in the news article that stuck with me was when the man said he had found it easier to stick with his standards 100 percent of the time than it was to stick with them 90 percent of the time, because when he stuck to his standards 100 percent of the time, he didn't waste time trying to decide what to do.

Lately, I have been reading and preaching from the Old Testament book of Daniel as part of my sermon series on the minor prophets. And I realized just how many "just this once" moments there are in that book.

In the first chapter, young men from the upper class in Israel were brought to Babylon, where they were to be trained to be in the service of King Nebuchadnezzar. The king himself gave the order that they were to be given certain foods in certain amounts and also wine. Daniel, and his companions Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego, did not want to eat the food that was given them because it would defile them according to their beliefs.

It would have been easy for the young men to let their dietary standards go by the wayside. But they didn't give in. And they proved that their vegetarian diet was better for them

There is a phrase that says "If you don't stand for something, you will fall for anything." There are people who go through their lives standing one place one moment and another at another time. Soon they discover they don't really stand for anything. That's a bad place to be.

So, where do you stand? Do you know? Perhaps it is time for us all to find out where we plant our feet, and then leave them there. Otherwise life gets to be pretty rocky.


