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Wind chill, snow threaten Colby area

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It may seem impossible, but just two days after temperatures in the 60s, Thomas County is in the path of what the National Weather Service is calling a "major winter

The plains and Midwest saw areas of light snow this morning, with heavier snow in the Rocky Mountains. The service is predicting the snow on the plains will move east throughout the day and expand south.

In Thomas County, the service is predicting blowing snow tonight and Tuesday, with temperatures as low as -3 degrees tonight and -12 degrees Tuesday night. The area could get 1 to 3 inches of snow tonight, but it is expected to taper off tomorrow, with less than one more inch Tuesday.

The real danger from this storm will be wind. The service has a wind chill warning in effect for the tri-state area until 6 p.m. Tuesday. Winds could get up to 25 mph with higher gusts. This could bring down temperatures to -25 degrees or lower factoring in wind chill.

The service issues a wind chill advisory when cold air and wind combine to bring percieved temperatures to -25 or lower. At that level, a person can get frostbite in less than 15 minutes, or get hypothermia if outside for too long. The service advises wearing hats and gloves.
