A new version of a computer have MS Excel. Excel spreadsheet called SUPP-COST, designed to help ranchers evaluate the indirect costs associated with delivering supplements to beef cattle, is now available on Kansas State University's Ag-Manager www.agmanager.info and animal science www.ksubeef. org websites.

"Given the era of high fuel prices and labor, we believe this software is a good tool for producers to evaluate their individual operations," said Dale Blasi, beef specialist with K-State Research and Extension.

Blasi, along with K-State extension agricultural economist, Kevin Dhuyvetter, developed the computer spreadsheet in DOS format more than 15 years ago. The updated version requires users to

All America-designated vegetables and flowers are determined by a widely scattered committee of American gardeners just like you and me. This network of gardener-judges is located in all climate zones of America and these judges must agree that the plants they are testing are superior in every way before they receive the coveted designation. Let's have a look at the vegetable designations today.

There are five new All America selections this year, and strangely enough, two of them are small cherry-type tomatoes. One has been named Terenzo, and the other is called Lizzano. Terenzo is a high-yielding cherry tomato, and Lizzano produces smaller grapetype fruit. Both are generally ready in 60 days after transplanting. Cherry tomatoes are becoming quite popular these days because of their versatility in hanging baskets, indoors or out.
