Deadline nears for windbreaks conservation funds

Friday, March 4 is this year's deadline for Kansas landowners to apply for cost-share funds available through the Cooperative Conservation Partnership Initiative. The funds are earmarked to help two declining natural resources: the region's aging and/or damaged windbreaks and riparian (streamside) forests.

"More than \$200,000 is available for the Kansas landowners who qualify. That amount could have far-reaching impacts," said Bob Atchison, rural forestry coordinator for the Kansas Forest Service.

"Recent surveys and satellite research revealed that the needs in Kansas are becoming critical," he added. "For example, 44 percent of Kansas windbreaks are in fair to poor condition now. Many were planted as a result of what we learned during the Dust Bowl. But they're no longer providing the conservation benefits they once had.

"Many of the trees that lined our major rivers and streams are gone or in decline now, too, due to changes in river channels and stream flows. As often as not, those changes were human-caused."

Costs that forestry conservation funds can shrubs, using weed barrier fabric or herbicides, installing fencing to protect seedlings from animal damage or installing a micro-irrigation drip system.

Landowners can apply at the Natural Resource Conservation Service office in the Service Center at 915 E. Walnut in Colby. Applications that miss this year's deadline go into the next year's selection pool. Self-assessment worksheets are available at

www.ks.nrcs.usda.gov/programs/eqip/2011/ self_assessment.html. "You actually can earn extra ranking points

if you complete the appropriate worksheet and get it to your NRCS office before the application-cutoff date. For the 2011 forestry initiative, that's March 4," Atchison said.

Information about the windbreak and riparian forest initiative is available on the Web at www.kansasforests.org/rural/lib/eqip.pdf.

The initiative is available only in Kansas, Nebraska and the Dakotas. Atchison said Congress plans to appropriate more than \$4 million dollars toward it over the next five years.

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
