ple encouraged her to run for the board, and since the candidates' names were announced in the Colby Free Press, she said she's gotten a lot of interest both inside and outside the county.

The college is important to Colby and the county for many reasons, she said. It is one of the largest employers here, and can be a major draw for new people. With affordable classes and tuition, it should be flourishing.

McMahan said the school has seen some poor choices by administrators in the past, but she prefers to focus on the future. The board should help direct the college's leadership, she said. "They should help the admin-

istrators make sustainable decisions," McMahan said. "We need a team that's going to go in and find a way to help the college succeed and grow.'

Finances will always be a problem, she said, and the board needs to create long-term solutions rather than look for a quick fix.

She said she would like to see

all the academic departments be science. self-sustaining and help with their own recruitment. One department, criminal justice, already actively pursues new students, she said, by putting on programs at area high schools. McMahan said she has experience in reaching out to prospective students, as she has to recruit people to attend her Homeland Security classes, such as one last year on livestock disease outbreaks.

The college needs to keep adding programs that will help people get jobs around here, she said. It needs to keep up with industries coming to Thomas County five or 10 years down the road, such as wind power.

One thing the college does well is putting on community events such as sports and concerts. It advertises well, she said, pointing to radio advertisements she has heard all along I-70. McMahan praised the members of sports teams and student groups who volunteer around town.

McMahan said her husband encountered a student who was choosing between Colby and Fort Hays State.

"You might think it would be no competition," she said, "but we have a lot to offer. Kids get more support. You don't get lost in the crowd."
