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# New siren goes online in Menlo

The tornado siren tower in Menlo is up and working.

Emergency Management Director Susan McMahan reported on the new tower to the county commissioners Monday. She said she had information that tornado alley will live up to its name this year, and reminded the commissioners the county has no insurance on any of the towers. If they were to be destroyed in a tornado, they are \$20,000 a pop to replace them. Insurance is only \$20 to \$25 a year, with only a \$500 deductible for each tower and she highly recommended looking for insurance.

McMahan said she needs a spot for a backup repeater and is looking at towers where she can mount it. She will report to them next week about possibilities for a permanent home for the repeater. She said she has a grant, but could send the grant back if she doesn't find a good place to put it.

We have to be the best at what we do, said Arlen Leiker, Colby Community College board member, when discussing how the college could grow its enrollment.

Leiker is running for re-election on April 5. He said quality programs are the only way the college can increase its enrollment and bring its financial situation under control.

Leiker, a United Parcel Service driver, said state aid to colleges has been decreasing and he wasn't sure if it would ever go up again. He said although the board is the hardest job he's ever had, he is running again because he thinks he adds something to the board as a whole.

Leiker pointed to his solo "no" vote against building a new residence hall in 2007 as proof of his ability to look at the big picture. He said the new residence hall, that has been partly responsible for the college's revenue shortfall due to lack of occupancy, has ended up being a worse decision than he previously thought. ## Twelve-year-old boy in custody in Burlington, Colo., double murder

BURLINGTON, Colo. - A 12-year-old boy who reported shots fired at his eastern Colorado home was in custody Wednesday after officers arrived to find his parents dead and two of his siblings in critical condition.

The boy called 911 Tuesday evening to report at least three people had been shot at his Burlington home, said Steve Johnson of the Colorado Bureau of Investigation.

When officers arrived, they found the bodies of 50-year-old Charles Long and his wife, 51-year-old Marilyn Long. Two of their children were wounded - a 5-year-old girl and a 9-year-old boy.

It was unclear whether the 12-year-old suffered any injuries. Warrants in the case were sealed, and authorities

weren't discussing possible motives. Investigators referred the case to prosecutors for possible filing of Johnson said there are no other suspects, and

there's no reason to believe there's a continuing risk to the community of about 3,700 near the Kansas border.

Less than 24 hours after the shootings, friends gathered for a candlelight vigil Wednesday evening
