The Trojans were to play Otero Junior College from Colorado in their home opening doubleheader starting at 1 p.m. The game was originally supposed to take place on Wednesday, but was rescheduled due to cold weather.

Coach Ryan Carter said he has mixed emotions about the season thus far. He said he has been really pleased with the way his team has been playing offensively.

"The whole team has been getting really good at bats," he said.

Carter said he has been a little disappointed by the trouble his pitchers have had finding the strike zone. The coach noted that 6 of the Trojans 7 losses this season have been by only one run. Colby's 7 losses have been by a combined 12 runs.

The Lady Eagles jumped out to an 11-8 lead by the end of the first. Colby led 23-19 at halftime. The girls outscored Dodge 10-4 in the third and led 33-23 at the end fourth 12-4 and took home a 45-27 victory.
