Changing exhibits just a small part of what's happening at Prairie Museum

Unlike some small-town museums where the most exciting activity is dusting the artifacts, there is always a lot going on around the Prairie Museum. This monthly column will attempt to give you a glimpse behind the scenes and keep you abreast of upcoming events.

After a successful month-long run, Anne Frank: A History for Today has been bundled up and shipped off. We were pleased to host this thought-provoking exhibit as a complement to our permanent military exhibit. Over Here Over There: Honoring Those Who Serve, which opened at the same time. Several Thomas County school classes took advantage of the free admission to attend, as did other area schools whose students and teachers benefited from discounted rates. Though the exhibit did cost us, we chose it largely for its educational value and wanted it to be as accessible as possible to area kids. Several civic organizations held their meetings in the Garvey Education Room so that their members could view the exhibits; and just as a reminder, this room as well as the barn and church are available to rent for meetings, weddings, reunions and receptions.

We continue to receive uniforms and other artifacts for the military exhibit. As with any donation, each of these items is carefully documented with an accession number, donor name, and description, with further research done if

necessary. Larry has had to build several new stands for the uniforms since we quickly exhausted our store of body forms, and each uniform is steam-pressed before mounting. So if you have donated a uniform but not yet seen it in the exhibit, be patient – it'll have its place in the case soon enough. We do plan to rotate different uniforms and objects in and out of the exhibit periodically to reduce the potential damage that can be caused by lengthy exposure to light.

Sue is interviewing Natalie Urbom about her service as a nurse in London during World War II. Larry Barrett is videotaping the interview, and this will be added to our growing archive of oral accounts of military and other life experiences. These can then be used as a basis for programs, research, and exhibits. We encourage all Thomas County senior citizens willing to share their military or home front experiences to contact us at the museum.

Leo Oliva was here on the 17th for February's "Food for Thought" talk. He gave a program on Kansas military forts, covering the

most well-known of these like Ft. Leavenworth and Ft. Hays, as well as more short-lived forts such as Mann and Atkinson.
