

Hints from Heloise

Hints smooth passport process

Dear Readers: Getting a United States PASS-PORT for the first time can be a little overwhelming, yet it's exciting and an important first. Here are some hints to help:

- First, the application. You can find these online or at any passport acceptance facility, passport agency and most post offices. DON'T sign the application until you submit it in person.
- · Get two passport photos; there are photoprocessing stores that do this. You must follow the guidelines.
- Submit the application in person. You can go to the post office, public library or other state, county, township or municipal government office, according to the U.S. Department of State. Some locations accept passport applications by appointment only; call first to be sure.
- When submitting your application, bring passport photos, proof of U.S. citizenship (a certified birth certificate, naturalization certificate or certificate of citizenship), proper identification (driver's license, government or military ID, naturalization certificate), a copy of that identification and the fee.
- Processing can take a while, so make sure you get your passport well ahead of travel dates.
- There also is a passport card, which costs less than a passport. It is valid for entering the United States from Canada, Mexico, the Caribbean and Bermuda at land border crossings or sea ports of entry, according to the State Department. It is not good for international travel by air. – Heloise

Bidding Quiz

1. Two clubs. The value of a hand rises or falls depending on the bids made by your partner and/ or the opponents. In this case, for example, when partner responds with one heart, the value of your hand falls at least a couple of points. It is bad news to learn that partner has length in a suit where you're void.

Your first reaction to the unwelcome heart response should be to draw in your horns and take things easy until you learn whether or not the hand is a complete misfit.

In line with this, you rebid two clubs. A great advantage of this call is that it is ambiguous, since an opening bidder's change of suit may be based on anywhere from 13 to 18 points. What happens next depends mostly on partner's reaction to two clubs. The original promise of the hand would be restored if, for example, partner were to jump to three diamonds.

2. Three hearts. There is obviously a good chance for game, but you must allow for the possibility that partner's response may have been based on absolutely minimum values (six or seven points). In fact, if his hand is so bad that he passes three hearts, he may have trouble making even nine tricks. Your hand is obviously too good for only two hearts; including distribution, it's worth about 18 points.

3. Two hearts. It is better to show your heart support at once than to rebid your six-card diamond suit. Either rebid puts you in the minimum opening range, but the immediate heart raise has the merit of indicating that most of your cards are in diamonds and hearts. This in turn suggests that you have shortness in spades and/or clubs.


