Fish and Wildlife Service to launch survey

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service will be expenditures." conducting its 12th National Survey of Fishing, Hunting and Wildlife-Associated Recreation.

Hunters, anglers and other wildlife enthusiasts across the nation will be asked to participate in interviews set to begin April 1. The survey, conducted every five years since 1955, will involve 53,000 households.

We appreciate the anglers, hunters, bird watchers and other citizens throughout the United States who voluntarily participate in the survey when contacted," said acting Director Rowan Gould. "The survey results help wildlife and natural-resource managers quantify how much Americans value wildlife resources in terms of both participation and

The survey is paid for by the Multistate Conservation Grant Program, authorized by the Wildlife and Sport Fish Restoration Programs Improvement Act of 2000. It provides the only comprehensive statistical database

on participation and expenditures for hunting,

fishing and wildlife-watching in all 50 states.

The information is collected by the U.S. Census Bureau, primarily through telephone interviews set for April to June and September to October, and January to March. Those contacted will be asked about their participation and expenditures in wildlife-associated recreation. The results will be available in a national report and 50 state reports.

87.5 million Americans enjoyed some form of wildlife-related recreation and spent more than \$122.3 billion pursuing their activities," said Hannibal Bolton, assistant director for the service's Wildlife and Sport Fish Restoration program. "The survey is a critical ... resource."

Participation is voluntary and all responses are confidential. Data is used for statistical purposes only and no participant can be identified from information in the database or reports, the agency says.

Preliminary findings will be available in the spring of 2012. Final reports will be issued beginning in the fall and posted at wsfrprograms. fws.gov.
