# Post office could lose sorting center

Colby's mail may soon go to Salina before heading on to its destination, though the service

says letters should not be delayed. The U.S. Postal Service is considering merging Colby's mail processing center, along with one in Hays, with the one in Salina.

Colby Postmaster Kenton Krehbiel said the Colby center serves any zip code that starts with 677, which includes most of northwest Kansas. Krehbiel said mail from those zip codes comes to Colby from about 25 post offices. The center sorts mail for those offices, and then sends that mail to each office to be sorted to individual mail carriers.

The Colby center processes about 8,500 pieces of mail a day, said Postal Service spokesman Brian Sperry. The post office employs 25 people, with eight in the See "SORTING," Page 3

processing center.

Central Plains Marketing Manager Dan Loukota said the Hays sectional center also is being looked at, along with Independence, Hutchinson and about 100 others around the county.

In a letter sent out to business that do a lot of mail, Loukota says the economic downturn and the Internet have led to a 20 percent decline in mail volume over the past five years, more than 43 billion pieces of mail.

"Stamped single-piece, firstclass mail - that's the kind of letter that people send to grandma or to pay their bills - has declined by 50 percent in the last decade,' Sperry said.

Consequently, the Postal Service is not able to keep up with the cost of processing and delivery. Krehbiel said the Colby post office has also seen the decline.

# Legislators far apart on pension funding

TOPEKA (AP) - Kansas legislators agree that the state pension system's long-term funding gap is a serious problem that must be tackled this year, but the dramatically different approaches being taken by the House and Senate could complicate efforts to settle on some solutions.

Both chambers have plans that would require the state to increase its annual contribution to the Kansas Public Employees Retirement System to support the future benefits of teachers, judges, police, firefighters and other government workers. Both ask public employees to make some sacrifices.

ventional wisdom among most officials - that Kansas law and past court decisions prevent the concessions imposed on teachers and state workers from being overly one-sided. The House plan appears to go against that convention wisdom, and some critics believe its passage would land the state in court.

The plans also differ in how quickly they want to move Kansas toward 401(k)-style plans for public employees. The House plan starts such a plan and makes it mandatory for teachers and government workers hired on or after July 1, 2013. The Senate proposal doesn't rule out such a move but
