Colby College board candidates speak

Voters got the chance to meet the seven candidates for Colby Community College board Tuesday in the college Cultural Arts Center, and heard them answer questions on issues facing the school.

Candidates Dinah Charles, Nick Wells, Angie Rogers, Susan McMahan, Arlen Leiker, Larry McDonald and Dale Herschberger each answered seven questions gathered from citizens, students and the college staff. Leiker and Herschberger currently serve on the board; McDonald is a write-in candidate while the other six are on the ballot.

Faculty Alliance President Bob Selby introduced the candidates and Tyson Miller, student government president, moderated the discussion. Candidate had two minutes to answer each question. They took turns going first.

Here's a summary of their answers:

Why do you want to be on the board, and why should citizens vote for you?
