Shop for food with a list and stick to it. People who shop with a list, and buy little else, spend much less than those who decide what to buy when they get to the market. The annual savings could easily be hundreds of dollars.

Banking

Keep track of your checking account to avoid bouncing checks and the associated fees. The \$20 to \$30 you save by not bouncing one check a month would save you \$240 to \$360 a year.

Reduce credit card debt by \$1,000. That debt reduction will probably save you \$150-200 a year and much more if you're paying penalty rates of 20-30 percent.

Make your monthly credit card payment on time. The \$30 to \$35 you save by not being charged a late fee each month will save you \$360 to \$420 a year.

Use only the ATMs of your bank or credit union. Using the ATM of another financial institution once a week could well cost you \$3 a withdrawal or more than \$150 over the course of a year.


