

Decide about wheat crop soon

A combination of record heat, dry soil and high winds in March and April has sapped the wheat in many parts of Kansas this year, especially where the plants emerged late and are small in western areas.

There is still time for wheat to recover to some extent if rains come in April, said Jim Shroyer, K-State Research and Extension crop production specialist, depending on the stage of growth and how severely the wheat has been stressed.

"Maximum head size is already determined where the wheat has jointed," he said," but kernel weight can still respond to good weather and can make up for some of the loss in yield potential.

"Even if the main tillers have died, secondary tillers can still begin growing this spring if the crown is still alive and the crop receives some rain and cool weather '

Where the wheat looks bad, Shroyer said, farmers have a dilemma. What's the yield potential of that wheat? Is the damage irreversible, or will improved conditions help? It might be a good idea to plan now for all possibilities, he said.

Farmers who have their wheat insured cannot do much until the insurance company releases it. After that, Shroyer said, there are a few options.

There is probably not enough forage present to be worth cutting, he said. If a farmer plans to plant wheat in the field this fall, he said, he should leave the failed crop to prevent blowing, then kill volunteer wheat before planting next fall.

If the field has been released by the insurance adjuster and the wheat dies or is terminated, producers could no-till a summer crop into the wheat residue, Shroyer said, assuming there is enough moisture and there is no herbicide carryover problems.

"Producers may be able to plant grain sorghum, summer annual forages or possibly soybeans into the residue...," he said. "Foxtail millet is a short-season, summer annual forage that could work well in this

If a stand of wheat is spotty, with part of the field alive and part dead, then it's probably best to spray the field with glyphosate before planting the summer crop, he added.
