Congressman meets public at town hall

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U.S. Rep. Tim Huelskamp paid his first visit to Colby on Tuesday since being elected.

Huelskamp held a town hall meeting in the Colby/Thomas County Chamber of Commerce meeting room. He said the meeting was one of a series he has been holding throughout the 1st District, trying to continue the tradition of meeting in each county at least once a year.

Huelskamp said he is part of a very large freshman legislator class that is trying to change the way Washington works. In the first week, he said, the House cut its own budget by 5 percent. The House has even reduced the military budget, he said, something unusual for a Republican Congress.

It also changed the schedule during the legislative session to give one week off every month. Huelskamp said he has been using that time to hold town halls.

Huelskamp brought charts with him showing national debt as a share of the economy. Right after World War II, he said, federal debt exceeded the size of the nation's economy, but was paid down very quickly.

Huelskamp said that under both President George Bush and President Barack Obama, the U.S. has had four straight years of trillion dollar deficits. National debt stayed level for decades, he said, but with those deficits it has increased and is going to hit 100 percent of the economy within the next few years.

Huelskamp serves on the House Budget Committee. He said he asked five economists how long the U.S. has left to solve its debt problem, and they each told him to "act like you have no time left."

Entitlements such as Medicare, Medicaid and Social Security are part of the problem and will make up the entirety of the federal budget if left unchecked. Social Security spending is fairly steady,

Governor asks federal agency for drought disaster declaration

TOPEKA (AP) - Gov. Sam Brownback is asking the U.S. Department of Agriculture to declare a Gove, Grant, Greeley, Hamilton, Haskell, Kearny, drought disaster for 21 counties in western Kansas.

The governor made the request in a letter Wednesday to U.S. Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack. The declaration would make affected farmers eligible for emergency loans from USDA's Farm Service Agency, and for other kinds of aid.

The 21 counties in Brownback's request are Finney, Lane, Logan, Meade, Morton, Ness, Scott, Seward, Sheridan, Sherman, Stanton, Stevens, Thomas, Wallace, and Wichita.

Brownback said farmers in those counties are coping with production losses caused by drought, wildfires and high winds.
