A One-Shot Decision
Certain defensive plays are considered by many to be virtually automatic, such as playing secondhand low or covering an honor with an honor. But those with sufficient experience have learned that there are exceptions to all such "rules.
Take this case where a defender could easily
go wrong playing by rote. West had a choice of unattractive leads against four spades and finally settled on the two of diamonds. Declarer played low from dummy, and East, after considerable thought, inserted the ten! When this held, the de-
fenders quickly collected the A-K of diamonds fenders quickly collected the A-K of diamon

As can be seen, had East played the ace of diamonds rather than the ten - following the rue of
"third-hand high" - declarer would have made the contract. The question, ther

But East reasoned that if declarer had this hand, West would have led the heart king from K-Q-x-x rather than a diamond from $K-x-x-x$. East
therefore placed South with the king or queen of hearts, which meant that playing the diamond te
offered the best chance of defeating the contract.
