Brownback's state plane from Topeka was greeted by a basketball-sized tumbleweed moments after landing in Garden City, where he talked with local farmers and ranchers at the 3i Show.

He rode a golf cart through several acres of farm products and implement displays at the agriculture trade show that has been held for the last 57 years in southwest

Cliff Mayo, who has been farming since 1952, said the conditions were the worst he had seen since the early 1960s.

"We did have an inch of rain 10 days ago. We're not as bad as some," Mayo said. "We'll bounce back once we get some rain. We're ready when it wants to come."

Brownback toured a dusty field owned by Dick Strandmark near the Finney-Haskell county line, where green, irrigated fields stood in stark contrast to fields that had sparse, thin stalks of wheat struggling through the parched soil.

Efforts to leave land fallow and bank moisture from rains have proved futile for the last year, Strandmark said. The little rain that did fall came before the crop was planted and didn't help it

"It's insured and that will help," he said. "We're trying to leave some coverage on it. It will have to carry it through next winter."

Parts of southwest Kansas haven't received significant rainfall since the summer of 2010, creating dire conditions for wheat and other crops, said Mary Knapp, state climatologist at Kansas State

University.

'We don't get too excited about having a dry period in our winter months, because we don't get a lot of our moisture in the winter," Knapp said. "But when you get half of nothing, it does get to be a of Cattle Empire feed lots. critical thing.'

From September through April, western Kansas received an average of 3.71 inches of rain, including 1.06 that fell in April, but normal precipitation during those months is 8.07 inches of rain, Knapp said

"Some places have seen less than that," Knapp said.

The conditions fueled wildfires in the region that caused significant damage along a key shortline railroad that serves farmers, ranchers and a burgeoning ethanol industry. In Sublette, about 35 miles south of Garden City, six bridges on the Cimarron Valley railroad were destroyed, including a 917-foot span built in 1913 that will cost between \$4 million and \$6 million to replace.

But residents said Wednesday that the impact was much wider. Grain and other products that were previously transported over those routes must now be re-routed through other areas, including into Colorado and Oklahoma. Truck traffic has increased, with it taking four vehicles loaded with grain to equal one rail car.

"If we lose the railroad, we would dry up and blow away,' said Bob Boaldin, a Morton County commissioner. "The railroad is He farms 1,500 acres of wheat the lifeblood of these communi-

Replacing the bridge could take counts since about a third of the railroad's revenue lost because of the burned track and bridges, said Henry Hale, operations manager for the railroad.

Brownback said he would speak with Kansas Department of Transportation Secretary Deb Miller about what the state can do to help rebuild the bridges and get cargo moving again.

Armstrong said the air carrier's insurance would have


to match the city's limit of \$1 million with a \$2 million aggregate. Britt said the company has \$1 million in liability plus \$100,000 per individual.

City Attorney John Gatz said he wanted to make the council aware before they voted that the city does not have coverage for bodily injury or property damage from aircraft. The city has purchased special event insurance in the past, he said, and there are some significant risks. Even broken bones could run more than \$100,000, he said, and some injuries cost more than \$1 million.

The council voted unanimously to allow the fly-in, pending insurance approval, and Council President Dave Voss and councilman Stan Schmidt, who are members of the Legion Riders, excused themselves during the discussion and voting.
