Mother shows strength in grief

May is the month we celebrate Mother's Day, so I thought it would be appropriate to celebrate a mother as I continue sharing my adventures in beading a bracelet about Biblical women of faith. This woman's story is a story of childlessness and grief, a not uncommon circumstance, especially in the Old Testa-

In the first and second chapters of 1 Samuel we meet Hannah. She was one of two wives of a religious and faithful man, Elkanah. The other wife. Peninnah, who was the mother of many children, would provoke and irritate Hannah because Hannah had no children. Elkanah continued to shower his love on Hannah, but still she grieved and wept bitterly because she was childless.

Once when the family was going to the temple to worship Hannah went off by herself to pray to the Lord, asking that she might have a son. As she cried and prayed silently to God she was observed by the temple's priest, Eli. He came up to Hannah, angrily accusing her of making a drunken spectacle of herself.

Hannah came to her own defense, claiming she was not drunk at all, but had been in deep prayer, bringing her worries and her pain to God. Eli, moved by her faith and her tears, blessed Hannah with the gift of peace and the promise that God would indeed grant her what she had asked. Hannah continued to worship nah and Elkanah return to their home, while 462-6342.

at the temple, then returned home, no longer grieving her barrenness.

As in many stories in scripture about barren women, Hannah becomes pregnant and has a son, whom she names Samuel, which means "I asked the Lord for him." But instead of keeping Samuel, a true gift of God, for herself alone, Hannah dedicates and gives her son fully to God.

After Hannah had weaned her son she brought him back to the same temple where Eli had found her praying. She gave her son to Eli, explaining, "Oh, my lord! As you live, my lord, I am the woman who was standing here in your presence, praying to the Lord. For this child I prayed; and the Lord has granted me the petition that I made to him. Therefore I have lent him to the Lord; as long as he lives, he is given to the Lord." (1 Samuel 1:26-28, NRSV)

Samuel remained in Eli's care. Eventually Samuel grew to become a priest himself and was the man who named and anointed David as king of Israel.

Hannah (which means grace in Hebrew) is remembered as a woman of great faith, trusting in the power of prayer and the compassionate strength of God, but also as a self-assured woman of courage who, when confronted by Eli, a man with much more authority and power that she, could speak up for herself and her

She was not too ashamed to hold back her pain or her faith in the Lord. She was also faithful in her unselfish dedication of her only son to God, an offering of sacrificial thanksgiving for God's great generosity to her. Hannah is a model of faith, gratitude and generosity that we would all do well to emulate.

Orchard grass can give fescue lawn the 'uglies'

Orchard grass is prized as a hay source and despised as a weed found in tall fescue lawns.

"It can make lawns look ragged within 24 hours of mowing," said Ward Upham, horticulturist, Kansas State University Research and Extension.

Like tall fescue, orchard grass is a cool-season bunch grass. It spreads via seeds, not underground plant parts. Once established, it grows in tufts or clumps and performs best in cool weather. (See photos at kswildflower.org/ grass_details.php?grassID=15.)

"It's also very visible in tall fescue lawns. Orchard grass is a noticeably lighter green. Plus, it grows so fast that it's soon sticking up above the mowed turf," Upham said.

landscape is much easier than getting rid of it, he warned.

containing a percentage of 'other crop seed' is likely to have orchard grass seeds in it...," Upham said. "Orchard grass is listed as a crop, not a weed, because it really is a widely used pasture grass.

"The best line of defense against

Bringing orchard grass into a this 'other crop' is buying good seed - preferably with zero percent contaminants. Once planted, "Any tall fescue seed marked as orchard grass has few and painful control options."

He recommends spot-spraying clumps with glyphosate (Roundup). After that, wait until the spots turn brown, cut out the clumps and replace them with fescue sod.
