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Golden Plains graduates 27 students


Golden Plains High School kicked off commencement season Sunday by graduating its largest class in history.

Six Colby High School students placed in the top six in their events at the 4A State Speech/Drama Championship Tournament on Saturday in Topeka.

In solo events, Michael Tubbs placed third in Lincoln/Douglas debate; Shelby Terrell, third in humorous solo acting; and Gabby Browne, sixth in serious solo act-

Will drought impact Kansas budget?

GARDEN CITY – The effects of Kansas' deepening drought seem to go on forever when seen from the air in a Kansas National Guard helicopter. Below, parched fields with crops that never sprouted, burnt railroads and brown pastures stretch into the dust-tinged horizon.

Many spots in southwest Kansas have had less

than two-thirds of their normal rainfall.

Melvin Neufeld, a farmer-rancher from Ingalls and former House speaker, says the last drought he remembers being this bad was nearly 60 years ago. Even then it took storms of historic proportions to break the spell.

"We had 24 inches of snow at the end of March followed by rain after rain," Neufeld
