



District cutting 2012 budget by \$400,000

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With the legislative session finally over, school districts are now getting the bad news.

Colby Superintendent Terrel Harrison told the school board on Monday that the final budget cuts \$232 per student of base state aid for the coming school year, she said. This brings state aid from \$4,012 — where it was cut for the 2010-2011 year — to \$3,780 per student, the lowest it's been since 1999.

Harrison said this will mean a total loss of about \$358,000 for the district. When the administration figured in the likely

drop in enrollment next year and rising fuel costs, they calculated a need to cut \$400,000 from the budget.

Harrison said if state revenue comes in low again, the governor may have to make addition mid-year cuts.

"They're not sure where we're at, but they're very nervous about the revenue," she said.

To combat the drop in funding, the school board approved across-the-board cuts to art, music, library, technology, groundskeeping, maintenance and custodial departments. The board reduced the food service director to half time and reduced the work hours of two retired employees. They also approved increasing fees for drivers' education — enough to

completely cover its cost — and cut several assistant coaching and other supplemental positions.

Those reductions have left about \$50,000 to \$75,000 still to cut, which Harrison said could be found in the general fund, but the district will probably not be able to move any money into capital outlay. This means the district will likely have to postpone some of the purchases in its five-year capital outlay plan.

The board may also raise some student fees, but that will be on the agenda at the July meeting.

Harrison said she would also be asking each sports department to cut two to three long-distance, non-league trips. The district could save about \$7,000 just from

that, she said. The administration will be looking at next year's sports schedules to see which trips to cut. Harrison said that if coaches wanted to still make the trips, they could raise money and pay for them out of their activity budgets.

Harrison said Larry Gabel met with the coaches to get ideas for new fund raisers. Ideas include a radio telethon, working more concessions and an athletics endowment.

"If we can do this and continue to offer every program, that's the way we should go," said board member Omar Weber.

Harrison agreed, but said that the district won't be able to maintain that if it has to endure any further cuts.

"We're right on the edge," she said.

"It's sad for our students and our community."

In other business, the board:

• Announced that contracts for middle school band teacher Stacey Williams and technical education teacher Jessica Bienhoff are not being renewed for next year. Board vice president Tracy Rogers read a resolution for each teacher. The teachers had been notified of the non-renewal in April.

• Heard Wieland say that the state assessment reports that will go out to parents will not be ready until the end of May, so the district will send them out along with report cards.

Universities asking for tuition increases

TOPEKA — Most students at state universities in Kansas would pay higher tuition next fall, with increases of up to 7.4 percent for some students, under proposals from the schools made public Wednesday.

The changes are designed to raise an additional \$30 million for the six state universities and the University of Kansas Medical Center in Kansas City, Kan. The new funds would help them cover rising utility and employee health insurance costs and other increasing expenses, and bolster academic programs.

Fort Hays State University would freeze tuition for both un-

dergraduate and graduate students who come to the western Kansas school from outside the state. But for other students on its campus and the others, tuition would increase at least 2.2 percent.

The Kansas Board of Regents released copies of the schools' proposals the day before their officials were scheduled to formally present them to the board, which oversees the universities and the state's community colleges and technical colleges. The board expects to vote on the proposals in June.

Board member Tim Emert, an Independence attorney and former state Senate majority leader, said the proposals aren't surprising.

ity in town in the 1970s and 80s, and the members would like to see it be that again.

"We want to keep it going like it used to be," Hamilton said.

The club opens at 5 p.m. Friday and Saturday, and the building is available for weddings or parties.

Participants will roll dice at each location. The highest hand will win \$1,000 and the lowest hand \$250. Fees to increase for 911 services

TOPEKA (AP) - Gov. Sam Brownback has signed legislation revising the fees that Kansans pay on phone bills to support 911 services.

The new law imposes a fee of 53 cents for all land-line and cell phone customers. It also sets a 1.06 percent fee per retail transaction on prepaid wireless telephones.

Revenue from the fees will go to county and city governments to help them provide and improve

emergency assistance systems. The law also creates a new council to monitor delivery of 911 services and suggest improvements.

Also Wednesday, Brownback signed a bill addressing hallucinogenic drugs marketed as "bath salts" as well as a new form of a chemical substance that mimics the effects of marijuana. The legislation adds both to the list of substances treated as controlled substances under state law.

Universities want a tuition increase

given tight state budgets and rising costs.

"Where else do we have to go?" he said.

The biggest increase in tuition would be paid by some non-Kansas undergraduates at the University of Kansas, who would see their rate rise by 7.4 percent, from \$9,075 per semester to \$9,750, a difference of \$675. The figures are based on a full course load of 15 hours.

However, the state's largest university also has a program in which it freezes tuition for undergraduates who promise to graduate within four years. The rates for students entering into those agreements would not jump as much - 6.2 percent for Kansas students and 5.2 percent for non-Kansas students.

Undergraduates from Kansas who are not part of the program also would see their tuition rise this fall by 6.2 percent, or by \$222, from \$3,584 to \$3,806.

Emporia State University is proposing to increase its tuition by 6.9 percent for undergraduate and

graduate students, whether they're from Kansas or not. The rate for Kansas undergraduates would jump from \$1,807 a semester to \$1,932, a \$125 increase.

Both the University of Kansas and Kansas State University said in their proposals that they would use a portion of the new dollars raised for student scholarships.

"The two challenges are a lack of state funding and, then, how much can you increase the price of tuition and still make it affordable?" said regent Ed McKechnie, a railroad company executive and former Kansas House member from Arcadia. "We have a goal to have a quality education, but you can't price yourself out of the market."

Other proposed per-semester increases for undergraduate students from Kansas are:

• At Kansas State University's campus in Manhattan, 4 percent, up \$132, from \$3,336 from \$3,468.

• At Kansas State's campus in Salina, 4.3 percent, up \$135, from \$3,159 to \$3,294.

• At Wichita State University, 6 percent, up \$142, from \$2,361 to

Wacky warnings contest names five finalists

DETROIT (AP) - Ballpoint pen-chewers, take note: The cap in your mouth can obstruct breathing if swallowed.

Common sense? Apparently for speakers of French, Spanish and German. The warning appears only in the English section of the multilingual instructions from the pen manufacturer, according to the creator of the Wacky Warning Labels contest.

The pen cap caveat is among five finalists announced Tuesday in the 14th annual contest that calls out silly warning labels and rails against lawsuits it deems frivolous.

"People in other countries do not sue when they cause an injury to themselves because their systems don't allow it," said Dorigo Jones, a Novi, Mich.-based senior fellow of the center.

Other finalists include "Does not supply oxygen" on a dust mask and "Avoid drowning. Remove safety cover from spa when

in use" on a hot tub cover. A more high-concept warning making the list is this label for a leather handgun holster designed to look like a personal digital assistant: "For gun only, not a functional day planner."

Another warning on the list tells would-be bicycle riders, "The action depicted in this brochure is potentially dangerous. The riders seen are experts or professionals." At least some of the children pictured have training wheels on their bikes.

The nominations were selected from entries submitted to The Center for America by mail. A live studio audience of a national television show is expected to select the three cash prize winners next month from the five finalists.

"We have become so over-warned in America," he said. "Many warning-label experts ... believe that warnings have gotten to the point that people ignore them now."

The executive director of a consumer group that aims to defend the civil justice system sees it dif-

ferently. "Litigation in this country is dropping like a rock in every state," said Joanne Doroshov of the Center for Justice & Democracy.

"To be of more benefit to the country we should take a look at people who have been injured by dangerous products who are no longer able to get into court because of tort restrictions that have passed... That's a far bigger problem," she said.
