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
On Friday the long-awaited opening of the Colby Aquatic Center will arrive.

Governor signs 20 new laws this week

TOPEKA - Kansas is launching an initiative to train more engineers, restrict private health insurance coverage for abortion, declare opposition to last year's federal health care overhaul and strengthen laws against drunken driving.

Gov. Sam Brownback signed 20 bills Wednesday, many of the measures sent to him as the Legislature's annual session ended earlier this month. He has until Monday to act on the rest, including a \$13.8 billion budget for the fiscal year beginning July 1.

Two bills outlined a 10-year, \$170 million initiative to boost engineering graduates over the next decade by more than 50 percent, from fewer than 900 a year to 1,365 a year.

"It is critical for us to do economic growth in the state of Kansas, and to me, you do that by targeting what you are best at and what you need to grow the economy," Brownback said. "I hear, constantly, employers talking about the need for more engineers."

One bill sets aside \$10.5 million in gambling revenues annually for 10 years, starting in 2012, to beef up engineering programs at the University of Kansas, Kansas State University and Wichita State University. Each school must match its \$3.5 million annual share.

Another bill authorizes \$65 million in bonds to expand facilities for the University of Kansas engineering school.
