

State groups to talk water here in July

In the space of two days in mid-July, two meetings will be held in Colby that could determine the direction of water management across the state.

The Kansas Water Congress will hold the first meeting from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Wednesday, July 20, at the Colby Community College student union.

The water congress is a group of government entities, industrial directors, mining firm representatives, groundwater management districts and representatives from each water basin.

"Virtually anybody who has a stake in water rights," said Wayne Bossert, manager of Northwest Kansas Groundwater Management District Four.

together several times a year to talk about water management issues and form recommendations to give to the Kansas Legislature. The Colby meeting is the congress' summer get-together. The meeting is open to the public.

Bossert said the full agenda hasn't been decided, but one of the issues on the table will be the Intensive Groundwater Use Control Area (IGUCA) program. Usually if there's a problem with groundwater levels, he said, the most junior water rights are cut off. The program allows the state to look specifically at the needs of an area and tailor a plan to fit them. Bossert said the plan could include scheduling - letting landowners pump water on different days - or requiring every water
