

SUV drives into lake late Tuesday

ity vehicle drove into Villa High Lake in what may have been a suicide attempt by a Colby girl.

Police Chief Randy Jones said the vehicle and driven into the park from Range Avenue at 10:56 p.m. Several witnesses saw it accelerate and go airborne into the middle of the lake.

When Colby Police officers Kyle Askren and Sam Steele and Sheriff's Deputy Tom Graham arrived on the scene, they found the vehicle partially submerged. Askren swam out to the vehicle and found a 16-year-old girl in the driver's seat, but no one else. The girl did not respond to the officer at first. He attempted to break the window with the handle of a knife, but couldn't and swam back

Steele gave Askren a telescoping baton. He and Graham swam

Late Tuesday night a sport util- back out to the vehicle and broke the passenger side window. The vehicle sank deeper once the window was broken and water poured inside. Jones said the girl regained consciousness and resisted the officers' assistance, but they were able to get her out of the vehicle and back to shore.

> The girl, a Colby resident whose name has not been released, was treated by Emergency Medical Services and Colby Fire Department personnel and then taken to Citizens Medical Center for ob-

> Askren was injured during the rescue and required some minor medical attention. The vehicle has been hoisted out of the lake.

Jones said the incident is still under investigation. The police log for Tuesday lists the incident as an attempted suicide.

State education board examines budget cuts

TOPEKA (AP) – Kansas State Board of Education members received new budget numbers Tuesday, along with the prospect of making tough decisions next

Legislators approved a \$232 per-student cut in state aid, effective with the budget year that begins July 1. It was a move designed to help the state close a one-time hole in the 2012 Kansas budget that approached \$500 million.

"I hope that if revenues start going up that they start funding education at the same percentage that revenues go up," said Board Chairman Dave Dennis.

He said he wasn't advocating a tax increase to return education spending to previous levels, though he believes there are parents who are willing to pay more to give their students a better edu-

The \$13.8 billion budget cuts overall spending 6.1 percent to close the projected shortfall. The spending plan reduces general aid to public schools by 5.6 percent, a move that's likely to force school districts to consider laying off teachers and other employees in the coming weeks.

General state aid to schools would see the largest decline in at least two decades, dropping from \$4,012 to \$3,780.

Last year, board members recommended a funding increase of nearly \$500 million to fund state statutes for education. However, the decline in state revenues and end to federal stimulus dollars forced Gov. Sam Brownback and legislators to reduce spending to balance the budget.

Dennis said it was likely that some of the items that have not been funded by legislators for

lege Board were told that Colby and five other community colleges experienced a significant increase in online enrollment last year during a special meeting Monday.

"EduKan passed the 13,000 Executive Director Dr. Mark Sarver. "Our online enrollments from out-of-state students have increased by over 36 percent with students in 43 states.'

EduKan is an online consortium consisting of Colby, Garden City, Dodge City, Seward County, Pratt and Barton County Community Colleges. Schwanke said EduKan figures a full time equivalency based on 15 credit hours per student, giving EduKan an estimated 866 credit hour mark," said EduKan students.
