dation that works with possibly abused children, providing mental health services, interviews and other support. The center has had 183 cases each year and is seeing more cases go to court, Robbins said.

Robbins said the cases are getting more serious and more services may be needed. The foundation faced a 30 percent reduction in one of their three state grants last year and an equal cut is expected this year. The foundation wants to make this money up to be able to continue to offer the same amount of time and support to the children.

"With or without support, we are here to help the kids in any way we can," Robbins said.

• The commissioners discussed healthcare policies for county employees.

After the healthcare reform legislation was put into action on March 23, 2010, employers were left with two options: They can stick to their current healthcare plan or fall under the new reform plan. If discussion over rewriting the Rural Fire District No. they choose to stay with the current plan, they can't make any changes to it. For example, no benefits can be added or taken away, no changes can be made to the deductible and no changes can be made to the

With the new health care plan, the commissioners would have to add more than 40 fully-covered services to the plan. These include HIV screenings, breast cancer screenings and obesity screenings.

The commissioners agreed that further research into the old and new health care plans is needed before any decision can be made.

• James Foster, representing the Kansas Department of Commerce's Office of Rural Opportunity, asked the commissioners to consider opting in to the Rural Opportunity Zones. This state program allows new residents to live in 40 Kansas counties tax free and provides students with money to pay off education loans.

The state and county would share responsibility for paying down qualifying loans, so county would have to provide "X" amount of money and the state would match it, Foster said.

 The commissioners ended their meeting with a 1 agreement. They decided to discuss the matter with the Sherman County Commissioners in order to decide what exactly needs to be done with the plan.

## Kansas plans four forums for Medicaid reform proposals

The state's budget, now \$13.8 billion, has long been under pressure from rising Medicaid costs, which tend to spike during economic downturns. Kansas' total Medicaid spending is expected to reach \$2.8 billion during the fiscal year that begins July 1.

An average of 344,000 Kansans are participating in the program each month, up 8 percent from a year ago. The state's total Medicaid spending has increased 48 percent in the past eight years, according to legislative researchers.

"I'm sure cutting costs is one of their highest priorities, but my hope is that we end up with a system that takes care of those individuals who need Medicaid," said Senate Ways and Means Committee Chairwoman Carolyn McGinn, a Sedgwick Republican.

Brownback has said repeatedly that he wants to rein in costs and improve the delivery of services. Colyer's team already has taken dozens of suggestions from groups and individuals, ideas that include increased use of managed care, changes in how prescription drugs are covered, more aggressive pursuit of fraud and even an end to Medicaid coverage of circumcision.

"We need to totally transform the Medicaid program, not just tinker at the edges," Colyer said, noting that it's still too early for his team to even outline its "basic tenets" for an overhaul. "We're going to be breaking out into lots of small groups that can talk about flesh out – ideas."

McGinn said she's not sure how much experimentation will be allowed by the federal government. She said she's hoping the review will lead to clearer standards about


