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Graduation may be after college again

The Colby School Board will talk about changing the dates for graduation and the seniors' last day it approved last month when it meets at 7 p.m. Monday in the district Administration Building.

Superintendent Terril Harrison said when adopting the school calendar, the board set graduation for Sunday, May 20, with the seniors' last day on Wednesday, May 16. That probably will have to be changed, she said, to Sunday, May 13, which is Mothers Day.

Harrison said Colby Community College will have its graduation on Saturday, May 12. Having graduations on two weekends will be a headache for the Community Building staff, she said, and might run expenses up. In the past, the college and high school have shared a weekend for graduation.

"We were trying to steer away from Mother's Day," she said, \$10,000. "but that was not to be."

The district will continue paying all costs of regular-season league trips, plus district and state events, she said.

Under the plan, the teams would have to pay for the longer trips out of their activity funds, and that might require more fund raising. Harrison said the district will continue to provide vehicles for transportation.

Those savings won't be large, she said, maybe \$8,000 to
