Blossom-end rot has various causes

If you have tomatoes with a sunken, brown leathery patch on the bottom of the fruit, you probably have blossom-end rot.

Though most common on tomatoes, blossom-end rot can also affect squash, peppers and watermelons. Not a disease, this condition is caused by a lack of calcium in the developing fruit. Does this mean there is a corresponding lack of calcium in the soil? Not necessarily, especially in Kansas. Most Kansas soils are derived from limestone, which is partially made up of calcium.

So what causes blossom-end rot? Actually, there are a number of possible causes, especially on tomatoes. Let's look at some of

Tomato tops often outgrow the root system during cooler spring weather. As long as it is cool, the root system can keep up. When it turns hot and dry, the plant has a problem, and water – with the calcium it carries – goes to the leaves and the fruit is bypassed. The plant responds with new root growth and the condition corrects itself after a couple of weeks.

· Heavy fertilization, especially with ammonium forms of nitrogen, can encourage this condition. It encourages more top than root growth and the ammonium form of nitrogen competes with calcium for uptake.

· Anything that disturbs roots such as hoeing too deep can encourage blossom-end rot. Mulching helps because it keeps the soil surface cooler - a better environment for root

• Inconsistent watering can be a factor. Keep soil moist but not waterlogged. Mulching can help by moderating moisture levels over time. You should also avoid damaging roots and watch fertilization.

But there are some years you do everything right and the condition shows up due to the weather. In such cases, remember that blossom-end rot is a temporary condition and plants should come out of it in a couple of weeks. You may want to pick off affected fruit to encourage new fruit formation.

Soils with adequate calcium will not benefit from adding additional calcium. If your soil is farmers and ranchers. deficient in this nutrient, add 1 pound gypsum

per 100 square feet. Gypsum is calcium sulfate and will not affect pH. Though calcium raises pH, sulfate lowers it and the two cancel each other out. Even if not needed, gypsum will not

hurt anything. We have also found that spraying plants with calcium doesn't work. The fruit's waxy surface doesn't allow absorption of the material and calcium does not move from the leaves

The best way to know what nutrients you have in your soil is to get a soil test.

Practice fire safety with grill, fireworks

The summer months are a time sition it away from siding, deck when families enjoy outdoor activities; it's also when barbecue grills and fireworks cause residential fires and serious injuries to

According to the United States Fire Administration, each year almost 5,000 Americans are injured by grill fires.

Fireworks send 3,000 children under the age of 15 to emergency rooms each year in the U.S. And sparklers, typically viewed as relatively harmless for children, cause serious burn injuries, accounting for one-third of the injuries to children under five.

Unfortunately, many fireworks injuries are not even reported.

Statistics show most grill fires on residential properties happen from May through August. On Independence Day, far more U.S. fires are reported than any day of the year, with fireworks accounting for 22,000 fires in 2008.

Safe Kids Kansas urges parents to reduce the risk of a fire or a trip to the emergency room and ensure this summer is a safe one.

Grilling Safety Only use the grill outdoors; po-

railings, out from under eaves and overhanging branches and a safe distance from lawn games, play areas and foot traffic.

 Keep children and pets away by declaring a 3-foot "kid-free zone" around the grill.

• Be careful when using lighter fluid. Do not add fluid to an already lit fire because flames can flashback into the container and explode.

• Do not wear loose clothing while cooking at a grill.

• When cooking food, use longhandled grilling tools to give plenty of clearance from heat and flames. Periodically remove grease or fat buildup in trays below the grill so it cannot be ignited when the grill is hot.

• Keep all matches and lighters away from children. Teach children to report any loose matches or lighters to an adult immediately. Supervise children around outdoor grills. • Dispose of hot coals properly

• If you smell gas while cooking on a propane gas grill, immediately get away from the grill and call the fire department. Do not attempt to move the grill.

 Never store propane cylinders in buildings or garages. If you store a gas grill inside during the winter, disconnect the cylinder and leave it outside.

Fireworks Safety

The best way to enjoy fireworks is to visit public fireworks displays put on by professionals who know how to safely handle fireworks.

· Always have a bucket of water or a fire extinguisher nearby. Know how to operate the fire extinguisher properly.

• Do not carry fireworks in your pocket or hold them close to your

• Do not modify fireworks or use homemade fireworks.

• Light fireworks only outdoors on smooth, flat surfaces, and aim them away from spectators, buildings, dry leaves, and flammable materials.

 Stand several feet away from lit fireworks. If a device does not go off, do not stand over it to investigate it. Put it out with water 0351, or visit www.safekids.org.

· Fireworks are intended for use by adults in open spaces and children should watch from a safe distance with plenty of adult supervision.

• Keep a phone handy, and know first aid for burns. **Gasoline Safety**

Never use gas to start a fire.

· Keep gas out of reach of children. Out of sight isn't enough, for any age. Store your gasoline where children cannot get to it in a well-ventilated area outside your vehicle and living space, such as a detached garage or outdoor storage shed.

• Use gasoline containers with a spout and automatic shut-off that will prevent overfilling fuel tanks.

• Never use old soda bottles or other makeshift containers to store

· Keep gas away from any source of heat, spark or flame. Even household appliances like water heaters and clothes dryers can ignite gas vapors.


