Moral challenges still face God

In 1993, the late Senator Daniel Patrick Moynihan wrote an article for The American Scholar entitled "Defining Deviancy Down: How We've Become Accustomed to Alarming Levels of Destructive Behavior." Moynihan argued that:


The amount of deviant behavior in American society has increased beyond the levels the community can 'afford to recognize' and that, accordingly, we have been redefining deviancy so as to except much conduct previously stigmatized, and also quietly raising the 'normal' level in categories where behavior is now abnormal by any earlier standard.'

In other words, our culture has chosen to address its moral breakdown by redefining right and wrong. Things which were once universally condemned as immoral are now considered moral. Moynihan went on to make this very prescient observation:

"This redefining has evoked fierce resistance from defenders of 'old' standards, and accounts for much of the present 'cultural war.""

Indeed it does. But things have changed since Moynihan made this observation. The culture war can now be spoken of in the past tense and those of us who cling to the old definitions have lost.

Syndicated columnist Charles Krauthammer predicted this just weeks after Moynihan's essay was published. He realized that if society no big deal. You know, that's the dance of the



was in the process of redefining its morals then it would also need to redefine its villains. If the old immorality was now moral then it exemplars must be considered moral too. And if the old morality was now immoral then those who continue to champion it must now become the villains. This is the way he explained it:

"The real deviants of society stand unmasked. Who are they? Not Bonnie and Clyde but Ozzie and Harriet."

This part of the country is one of the last bastions of the old morality, though Ozzie and Harriet would be shocked to see how far we have drifted from our moorings. But generally speaking, we are still "old fashioned" enough that we are held in scorn by the "more sophisticated.'

Listen to the way we were described just last week by New York Times columnist David Carr

"If [an idea comes from] Kansas, Missouri,

low-sloping foreheads."

So what is a Neanderthal who continues to believe in the old definitions to do? The Psalmist addressed this very question in the eleventh Psalm when he asked, "If the foundations are destroyed, what can the righteous do?" (Psalm 11:3)

He answered his own question by reminding himself of several foundational truths. The first is that despite appearances to the contrary. God is still on the throne: "The Lord is in His holy temple; the Lord's throne is in heaven" (Psalm 11:4a)

Second, we need to remember that God uses times like these to test us, to draw a line in the sand to see whose side we are on (Psalm 11:4b-5): "[God's] eyes behold, His eyelids test the sons of men. The Lord tests the righteous and the wicked, and the one who loves violence His soul hates.

Third, someday each of us will judge us all, and on that day we will be evaluated, not the basis of some socially constructed - or deconstructed - system of morality, but by His own standard (Psalm 11:6-7) ... and that standard, like the one who gave it, never changes.

suggest a number of deciduous trees died suddenly this spring.

"Some never leafed out," said Ward Upham, K-State Research and Extension horticulturist. "Others leafed out, then lost their new growth. Despite how they look, though, many are still alive."

Since last summer, regional weather has been challenging records in a see-saw of temperature and moisture extremes, he explained. For trees, that's meant stress.

"Tender buds and leaves are the first to suffer," Upham said. "If that's the extent of the injury, though, established trees could soon be bouncing back."

extends beyond dry, brittle twig ends. Tree owners must shave off some outer bark from several wilt took advantage of the tree's youngish branches.

"If the tissue underneath is greenish-white, there's hope. Owners should keep the tree watered and give it time," he said. "If the cambium layer is watersoaked or near-black, the tree's probably dead."

Upham added that dead-looking for disease testing at K-State. trees could be in any of the following categories:

• Highly stressed, the tree only had enough food reserves to leaf out and grow for a while. Then the leaves wilted, and the tree finished dying – seemingly overnight.


